IS COUNTY AGENT WORK TO BE CONTINUED?

State and Federal Aid to Be Given only Where Counties Provide \$1,200 per Year

On election day there will be twenty-five or more men out securing signatures to a petition to have the county commissioners give out aid to the county agriculture improvement work.

Few Have Provided Funds Progressive farmers, business and professional men and banks have dug down deep in their pockets and brought up the funds necessary to conduct this work.

Federal and State Aid The Agricultural Extension Service and the United States Department of Agriculture will contribute \$1,200 per year toward maintaining this work in counties as far as these funds are available.

County to Help The local funds required can be raised by an appropriation of the county commissioners in accordance with section 70, revised statutes of Nebraska, 1913.

Work Stands on Its Merit The county agent work is standing upon its merits alone. There is no politics connected with it.

To Present Petition If you believe that county agent work should be continued in Box Butte county and supported by all rather than a few, you are asked to sign the petition which will be presented to you in a short time.

Some Benefits Derived The following are some of the benefits to the people of Box Butte county as a direct result of County Agent work during the past one and one-half years:

- 1. Brought about a better spirit between improvement organizations of the county.
2. Demonstration and adoption of crop and live stock improvement methods.
3. Conducted "get together" tours for the study of better farming methods.
4. Maintained a Farmers' Exchange.
5. Movable Farmers' Institutes.
6. Secured and assisted with soil survey.
7. Farm management surveys.
8. Established Boys' and Girls' Club Work—bringing home and school together.
9. Movement for better homes, better schools and better social conditions.
10. Assistance in marketing—A leading part in securing the cooperation of the Office of Markets and Rural Organization and daily assistance rendered in the issue of the potato bulletin of the Market News Service.

Broken Brake Beam Cause of Derailment on Burlington Saturday—Tram Tied up

Six freight cars were overturned Saturday morning at Birdside siding, east of Alliance, when a brake beam came down, causing the derailment of a portion of No. 48, west bound, on the C. B. & Q.

Four cars of lumber and two cars of coal were mired up together on the track and along the embankment as the result of the derailment of No. 48.
