Arrangements to supply General Pershing's forces with new war ammunition in liquid form indicate that Uncle Sam is getting ready to "fight the devil with his own fire."

We shall never again have to depend on Germany either for dyes or optical glass. Under the pressure of war shortages American invention has met the need and brought the country permanent benefit.

Both La Follette and Mayor Thompson are credited with Presidential ambitions for 1920. However that may be, each is fighting to prove a superior claim to the platform of "Dutchland over all," the United States included.

When the Germans, Austrians and Turks are ready to withdraw unconditionally from conquered territories and repair the ravages wrought the discussion of terms will begin, but until then "peace" talk can be little more than a waste of wind.

A report comes from Camp Meade that the men in training there will be in France inside of four months. If the raw troops of the National Army can be whipped into shape in so short a time, the end of the war is not as far off as it sometimes seems.

Germany how hints that she may be willing to give up Belgium for

compensations and even contribute a "share" of a war indemnity paid that country. This looks as if the gradual climbing down process has begun. When it reaches the point of unconditional surrender there will be something doing in the peace line.

Sweden has certainly played the role of Germany's masked messenger boy to some purpose. It is announced from Washington that Secretary Lansing is in possession of 415 secret messages exchanged by the Kaiser's government through Swedish aid. No wonder the astounding facts are said to have "taken away the breath" of the foreign diplomats at Washington. Germany is a hard master and all that Sweden dares to do is to pretend pitifully that the role of diplomatic lackey is not unusual.
