NEWS OF TOWN AND COUNTY.

Picard Bros., carpenters and builders, have just placed in their work shop a planer, band saw and a gasoline engine. With this machinery they will be able to turn out work that they have heretofore had done at the mill.

The building operations in North Platte this year will exceed those of last year, excepting the improvements made by the Union Pacific. Some of the contractors are so busy finishing up work that they have "turned down" men who desire new residences erected.

The small boy was particularly active. Hallow e'en night and soaped practically every show window on Dewey street. Vehicles were taken from lots and pulled to faraway sections of town, movable steps were removed, and small outbuildings upturned. Altogether the boys had "lots of fun."

Beet growers of the Hershey section are shipping beets rapidly, and it is probable that the tonnage siloed will be small. The beets are yielding very well, some growers having patches that exceed twenty tons to the acre, while other sections of the fields run from fourteen to twenty tons. The average price of the beets under the percentage test is \$4.50.

In the game of football at Kearney Friday, the North Platte high school foot ball team was defeated by the Kearney Military Academy eleven by a score of five to nothing. The ball was in the North Platte field the greater part of the time, and on several occasions it was advanced to the three-yard line, yet the North Platters were unable to secure a touch down on account of the strong resistance of the bulky academy boys.

A Successful Company.

The present North Platte telephone company has been in business sixteen months and during that time it has increased the number of phones in use in the city to 564, and in addition has encouraged seventy-four farmers, living along lines running into North Platte, to put in phones.

This increase more than doubles the system as it existed prior to the present company taking hold, and the subscribers are thus getting the benefit of the increased number of people with whom they can communicate without additional cost.

During the past sixteen months the company has strung 10,042 feet of copper and lead cable weighing 14,240 pounds, which gives an additional 600 wires to the central office. It has shipped in four cars of poles for telephone work, and replaced 174 old phones with new instruments. All of these improvements add, of course, to the efficiency of the service rendered.

This is certainly a most excellent showing and certainly reflects credit on Manager Warner and his company and is evidence that they are anxious to do anything and everything reasonable to give the patrons the best possible service, and there is no question but that the service at present is as good as will be found anywhere. One thing especially commendable about Manager Warner is the promptness with which he attends to and rectifies any complaint made by patrons, thus evidencing his desire to satisfy everybody with the service.

Recent Deaths.

DAVID JONES.

David Jones, one of North Platte's oldest residents, both in years and in length of residence, died Saturday morning. Death was due to trouble incident to old age, the deceased being about eighty. He had resided in North Platte for thirty-five or more years, having been stationed here as a soldier at the barracks in the early 70's. He was in the service of the government for a number of years, enlisting in 1857 in the Second United States artillery. He leaves five daughters—Mesdames Otten, Lockwood, Workman and Moran and Miss Pink Jones and three sons, Tim, John and Frank, to mourn his death. The funeral was held from the family residence yesterday afternoon in charge of the G. A. R., of which order he was a member.

JOHN MCEVOY

John McEvoy, son of Mr. and Mrs. P. H. McEvoy, died at seven o'clock Sunday morning of heart affection with which he had been afflicted more or less for some time past. The deceased worked in the car repair gang, and on October 16th became so ill that he was compelled to quit the service. While his condition was considered serious, death was not anticipated, and it came as a great shock to the young wife and the parents. The deceased was an industrious young man of good habits, spending all his spare time at home in the company of his wife and two children—one of the latter being two and one-half years and the other four months. He would have been twenty-five years of age the eighteenth of next month. The funeral was held from St. Patrick's church at nine o'clock this morning.

This is the second child Mr. and Mrs. McEvoy have lost within three months and to them and the young wife the sympathy of our people is extended.
