Submit Proposition.

At the special meeting of the city council Friday evening called to consider the waterworks question. President Hoffmaster of the American Waterworks Co., was present and asked the mayor and council for a short time. He stated that at the time the appraisal of the plant was made the company had expended \$139,000 on it and up to the present time \$141,000.

The council rejected the offer of the water company to send an engineer here to over the city engineer's estimate and Goodman offered the following resolution, which was seconded by Herminghausen: Be it resolved, by the mayor and council of the city of North Platte, Nebraska, that, for the purpose of settling the waterworks question at as early date as possible, the said mayor and council hereby agree to submit to a vote of the people of said city a proposition to vote bonds in the sum of sixty (\$60,000) thousand dollars, for the purpose of purchasing the present waterworks plant, together with all appurtenances, tools and appliances that are owned by the said plant, providing the owners of said plant will agree in writing, according to details satisfactory to the said mayor and council, to sell and convey said plant, appurtenances, tools and appliances, free and clear of all incumbrances whatever; to make delivery of the same and formal transfer thereof to the city of North Platte, Nebraska, not later than ninety days after the bonds are so voted; to accept the bonds of said city in the sum of \$60,000, so voted, in full payment for said plant, appurtenances, tools and appliances and notify said mayor and council by the time of their next regular meeting, that this proposition has been accepted.

The vote on the resolution was: Yes, Goodman, Herminghausen, Sullivan, Tracy, Yost, N. Tobin. In offering the resolution, Mr. Goodman said that it was time to settle the water question and that in adding 15 per cent to the Engineer's estimate for any mistakes he may have made, he finds that \$60,000 will cover the amount. The council adjourned until the next regular meeting on July 6th.

Boost Alfalfa Mill.

Mr. Editor—As there has been considerable discussion going on between the farmers in regard to the creation of an alfalfa mill and probable success as a paying venture, and at the same time the grower receiving from two to four dollars more per ton for his hay, the proposition from my point of view looks good. Alfalfa meal is worth twenty-one dollars a ton on track at shipping point to day and dealers are anxious to contract all this year's crop at that price. Then there is mixed feed manufactured at the mill, corn and alfalfa and alfalfa and oats, etc., to be ground into meal, making a demand for grain at the mill which the farmers will furnish and get better prices than they are now getting. Now this is a business that can not be over done, because the demand will always exceed the supply. It is the balanced ration and is being fed extensively to all kinds of stock, horses in particular. Now as to profit, suppose the mill pays the farmers eight dollars a ton for loose hay, which is two dollars a ton more than he gets when he bales it, as he has been getting about eight dollars a ton on track on an average one year with another. Of this amount it costs two dollars to bale and load it. Now say there are about three thousand tons at present that could be delivered at North Platte lose this year and the growers received two dollars a ton more than they had been getting. This would net them \$6,000 more than any previous year, naturally they will have that much more to expend. The farmers will double their acreage at once. Now as to profits accruing to the mill, the alfalfa costs them eight dollars a ton loose. It costs all told, including manufacturing, storing and selling four dollars after the mill is built. Now eight dollars and four dollars are twelve dollars. The meal is sold for twenty-one dollars a ton, which leaves them a profit of nine dollars a ton. A 4-ton-an-hour mill running ten hours a day would grind at least thirty tons, which would clear \$270 a day. Figure this for 150 days and you will find this would pay the company better than bank stock twice over, figuring on a basis of \$25,000 to build and equip the plant and

cash to do business with. They can also ship in hay and run nine months in the year. They can pay fourteen dollars a ton and then make money. A mill run right and managed well would pay three dollars a ton profit. I believe in cooperation and when a mill is built the growers ought to take stock in it and get it on the front seats. Big Sugar Factory.

The following will be of interest to the beet growers of Western Nebraska: That a great beet sugar factory costing \$1,500,000 will be built by the American Beet Sugar company at Scottsbluff was declared today by Senator Burkett to be assured. For some time negotiations looking up the enterprise have been on foot, the senator having means of knowing what was doing. He has been informed that it is certain that the establishment will be erected.

"There will be 25,000 people in that irrigated district in another ten years," said the senator today, "and it will be one of the famous garden spots of the country."

The senator is working on a new plan to secure early completion of the third section of the North Platte irrigation project, and declared today that he expected it would succeed, to the relief of the settlers in that region who need water.—Omaha World Herald.
