U. P. Securing Right-of-way. These two paragraphs are taken from the Bridgeport Blade:

The Union Pacific Railroad Co. this week made application before County Judge Steuterville to have a board of appraisers appointed to fix the value on certain lands in Morrill county which are needed for the extension of their North Platte valley line west from Bridgeport, the present terminus of the road.

F. A. Ayer, right-of-way agent for the Union Pacific Railroad Co., was in Bridgeport yesterday perfecting the details for the construction of the new line through this valley. He informed us that the right-of-way had been purchased through Morrill and Scottsbluff counties west of Gering to a point nearly opposite Mitchell.
