Patriotism for the fatherland is strong with German residents in Lincoln county, so strong in fact that if a newspaper happens to give an unbiased report of the war news and thus fails to boost the army of the fatherland, the German resident becomes "sore" and orders his paper discontinued. Several instances of this kind have occurred in The Tribune office.

The Tribune editor has read no argument that has changed his opinion on the question of woman's suffrage; he is ready to accord to women the right to cast a ballot. He believes that a majority of the voters in Lincoln county, as well as in the state, hold a similar opinion and that woman's suffrage will be triumphant in Nebraska next Tuesday.

Chairman Streit's effort to rob Congressman Kinkaid of the credit of the enactment of the 640-acre homestead law is not likely to cost Judge Kinkaid any votes. It is the man who accomplishes things, and not the one who attempts and fails, that is entitled to the greatest meed of praise. The first man to advocate the enlarged homestead was the late I. A. Fort; this latter statement being made to set history straight.

The announcement of P. R. Hallinan, republican candidate for county attorney, that, if elected, he will pay out of his own pocket whatever legal help may be necessary in conducting important cases in which the county may become involved, is worthy of consideration by the taxpayers. In times past thousands of dollars have been expended by the county in hiring lawyers to assist the county attorney, and this, too, without much benefit to the county.

The Lincoln Journal calls attention to the fact that the Omaha World-Herald was for fifteen years a faithful supporter of R. B. Howell in the latter's fight for the municipal ownership of water in Omaha. Now that Mr. Howell is the republican candidate for governor the World-Herald can see no good in him and distrusts his fitness for governor. Mr. Howell as an Omaha citizen fighting a corporation for the good of the people and Mr. Howell as a republican candidate are two different men as viewed by the World-Herald.

Congressman Kinkaid will probably visit North Platte this week while en route to his home in O'Neill. Mr. Kinkaid was unable to leave Washington until after the adjournment of congress, there being several measures before that body in which this section of the country needed protection. Owing to the lengthy session he was unable to attend his campaign; he stuck to his post at Washington, trusting that his friends in his district would remain true to him. This they will undoubtedly do, for each year Mr. Kinkaid serves in congress the more valuable his services to the Sixth district become. He will undoubtedly be elected by the usual large majority.

Jay Hollingsworth, of Ogalala, came down Sunday and drove home a Chalmers car. He conducts a garage and salesroom in Ogalala.

The Tribune hopes that before the 1916 election the people of Lincoln county will agree to have five county commissioners instead of three—one from the south part of the county, one from the north, one from the west, one from the east and one from North Platte city. More expense for the taxpayers, you say? No, less expense, for the five would do the business of the county in less than half the time that three require. Each commissioner would look after the road matters in his district; it would not be necessary as at present for all three commissioners to spend half their time making fifty or eighty mile drives to view roads; each section of the county would be more directly represented on the board and would feel that they were not being ignored while other sections were being favored, and the county expenses could be more closely watched and hundreds of dollars thereby saved. Lincoln county is too large in area to be governed by a board of three commissioners.

It was Kinkaid who gave us the section homestead law. The settler can now prove up in three years with five months off every winter to send his children to school. WAR SUMMARY

The supreme efforts of the fighting men of the five nations have failed to turn the tide of battle along the Franco-Belgian border. Latest reports yesterday were that a struggle of unparalleled fury was still in progress along the North Sea, where the Germans with reckless bravery are flinging their troops against the allies' forces. The French official statement indicates an attempt to cut off the Ger- right wing has made some progress. If, as said, the allies have established a front from Yser to Roulers, the German line has been thrust back in a sharp angle, the point of which is considerably to the northward of their forces on the shore of the North Sea.

The battle rages along the Yser, with frightful destruction of life. Air engines, sea engines and land engines of death sweep the desolate country, vertically, horizontally and transversely. Through it, the little, frail human engines crawl and dig, walk and run, skirmishing, charging and blundering in little individual fights and tussels, tired and puzzled, ordered here and there, sleeping where they can, never washing, and dying unnoticed. A friend may find himself firing upon a friendly force, and few are to blame.

German and Austrian forces, it is said, have now a strong wall of troops along a well established line which stretches from the northern spurs of the Carpathians before the long disputed fortress of Przmyśl and on into the district of Plock. Before this line is arrayed the main army of the Russians, now said to have been re-inforced by troops from the Caucasus, Siberia and Turkestan. The Austrians claim successes in engagements to the north-east of Przmyśl and on the lower San.

No word had come yesterday afternoon of the fighting at Tsing-Tau, where a small German garrison is attempting to stand off attacks by land and sea from the combined Japanese and British forces. Recent reports that relations between China and Japan were being strained were strengthened by word from Peking that the Chinese foreign minister had demanded the surrender of a Japanese torpedo boat which entered Chinese waters and attempted to take away the wreck of the torpedo boat beached by the German to escape destruction by the Japanese.

A message from Berlin confirmed recent reports that General von Moltke was no longer acting as chief of the German general staff, owing to his illness. It was said his place was being filled by General von Falkenhayn.
