By a vote of twenty-two to eight, the state senate Tuesday killed the bill which sought to compel clubs and organizations in the state which dispense liquor to its member to take out a liquor license and conform with the liquor laws which provide for a closing at eight o'clock. Senator Randall, who comes from the prohibition of York, was one of the leaders of the opposition.

Because of "humanitarian reasons," the Electro Steel company, of Pittsburgh, asked by the Pittsburgh foreign trade commission to bid on the contract to furnish part of the order for one million drop forge shells, valued at \$4,000,000, and wanted by the British government, declined to make an estimate. Attached to the blueprint which was presented to the commission was a note which read: "For humanitarian reasons, this company finds itself obliged to refuse to consider the contract."

North Platte is a growing town and as such has a number of propositions to meet within the next five years. First among these is greater school accommodations; extension of water mains which can only be made by the issuance of bonds; the taking over of the city cemetery, the construction of a water main thereto, and a yearly levy for the maintenance of the grounds; the construction of new bridges across both the North and South Platte rivers, as both are getting in bad condition; and lastly the paving of our business streets. Four of these propositions mean the issuance of bonds, and no matter what our opinion may be in regard to increasing our bonded debt, we may as well look these matters fairly in the face and be prepared to meet them. They are certain to come.

The proposition to take over the city cemetery was discussed at the meeting of the city council Tuesday evening. The one great hindrance to this action is that of getting water to the cemetery grounds. To lay a main thereto will cost \$1,200 or \$1,500, and that much money is not available now and is not likely to be for some time. We understand that the council figures that it will be as late as July 1st, 1915, before all of the \$12,000 in water department warrants now outstanding can be paid, and not until these are paid will there be money available for extensions—and perhaps not then. A number of extensions of water mains are urgently needed, and the only way to secure them will be through the issuance of bonds—which can either be levied on property in a created water district or levied upon the entire city. The water district plan would probably be rather strenuously opposed.

**Vital Statistics of Lincoln County.**  
The bulletin issued by the state board of health for January gives the following vital statistics for Lincoln county:

Births from December 1, 1913, to December 31, 1914—217, of which 163 were males and 149 females; 302 were American, two German, eight Scandinavian, three British, one Bohemian and one unclassified.

Deaths from December 1, 1913, to December 31, 1914—one hundred.

During the year 1913 there were seventeen applications for divorce, ten of which were granted and seven dismissed.

One hundred and eighty-one marriage licenses were issued during the year 1913.

The divorce and marriage licenses issued for the year 1914 have not yet been tabulated.

Closely following the last act of the "Spinsters Return," came the last but not least of the evening's amusement, a big dance at which those caring to dance were given the privilege until long after the midnight hour, Crowe's orchestra furnishing the music.

Who Died February 11th, 1915, aged 57 years, 10 months and two days.

William Griffiths was born April 9, 1857, at Penryford, North Wales. He was united in marriage to Miss Francis Okell, of Barnow, Cheshire, England, June 16, 1877, at St. Bride's church, city of Chester, England. They sailed from Liverpool May 25, 1882 to Quebec, Canada, thence journeyed to Rodman, Ia., later went to Illinois, thence to Kansas, and from there to the eastern part of Nebraska. In 1890 Mr. Griffiths and family located in Dickens precinct, this county, where they have since resided. The deceased leaves a wife and eleven children, six sons and five daughters, all of whom make their home in the Dickens vicinity. They are Frederick, John George, Mrs. Arthur Gartrell, Mrs. Gilbert Smith, William Harry, Thomas Hugh, Francis Sarah, Frank Cyril, Leslie Lee, Mrs. William Murrain and Hazel.
