Exhibits For County Fair.
 The Lincoln County Fair Association has employed John H. Gilman, of Leavenworth, Kansas, an exhibitor of national repute, to assist in arranging a display for the Lincoln County Fair, the Nebraska State Fair, and the International Dry Farming Exposition to be held in Denver. Mr. Gilman is an expert at preparing agricultural exhibits for display, and is here to assist anyone interested in exhibiting. It is now time for preparing sheaves of small grain and grasses. These should be collected before they are quite ripe enough for the binder, dried carefully, principally in the shade, stripped and bound into sheaves 3 1/2 to 4 inches in diameter. When exhibited the sheaf of grain must be three inches in diameter and the sheaf of grass 1 1/2 inches in diameter at the middle band. All grain and grass should be cut close to the ground so as to get all the length possible. Sample sheaves may be seen at the Platte Valley Bank.
 Large sheaves of grain or grass carefully selected in the field will be welcomed by Mr. Gilman, if delivered the day it is cut. He will then dry these and prepare them for exhibit. These sheaves prepared by Mr. Gilman may be shown in competition by the grower at any fair except the Lincoln County Fair. For exhibition at the local fair, the exhibitor must prepare his own exhibit. Neither Mr. Gilman nor the fair managers will be able to get out over the county to any great extent. Therefore the size and merit of the exhibit will depend on the people throughout the county.
 It is urged that the town people, when in the country, collect sheaves of exceptionally good grain or grass and deliver these to the experiment station or to Mr. Sebastian.
