At the meeting of the city council Tuesday evening the street lighting contract with the electric company was approved, and its adoption or rejection will be submitted to the voters at a special election to be held September 14.

The contract, while it calls for the expenditure of a little more money than did the former contract, the city receives more lights of a greater candle power, and therefore we will have better lighted streets.

This contract is the result of investigation of a committee of citizens, who held a number of consultations with the officials of the electric company, and the provisions therein are satisfactory both to the committee and the company. The contract was drawn by the committee and accepted by the company and is considered very fair to both the city and the company.

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
