Will Prospect for Oil

A lady who lives on Medicine creek in Frontier county just over the Lincoln county line, was in town Tuesday and said that parties are leasing land along the creek with a view of prospecting for oil. This lady says that the ground along the edge of the creek seems strongly impregnated with oil, that if you dig down a few inches water fills the hole and after a few minutes a light skim of oil covers the water.

Medicine creek flows through the south part of this county but as yet no leases have been made on Lincoln county land. The leases in Frontier county are being made for one year, with the privilege of an extension of the leases.

The fact that the leases are being made is creating considerable excitement in that section, and already the residents are planning to do certain things when they "strike it" on their lands.


