700 Men on Pay Roll.

There are now seven hundred men on the permanent pay roll of the Union Pacific at this terminal, this not including the men employed at the ice houses, which vary in number. The approximate number in each classification is as follows: Shops, roundhouse and car department 250, engineers and firemen 240, conductors and brakemen on Third district and branch including the passenger service 140, office and yard men 40. In only one department has there been a decrease within the past year or so, and that is in the shop and roundhouse force, this showing a falling off of about forty-five. The wages of these men range from \$55.00 to \$180 per month.

Cody Sues Pawnee Bill.

A Denver paper says: Major Gordon W. Lillie (Pawnee Bill), must defend the suit brought against him by Col. William F. Cody (Buffalo Bill) for an accounting of the affairs of the Wild West show which they owned jointly at one time. Yesterday Lillie, thru his attorney, asked Judge Denison, to dismiss the suit because Colonel Cody had not taken any steps in it for more than a year, but Judge Denison refused to grant the motion, after it had been pointed out to him that Lillie himself had not done anything to bring the case to an issue. Colonel Cody claims that if an accounting is had of the business of the show and of the sale of its assets it will be found that a considerable sum of money is due him from his former partner.

Lamb Will Erect Building.

R. N. Lamb has practically accepted plans for a business building which he will erect on the west side of Locust street between Seventh and Eighth. This building will be 88x100 feet, one story, with pressed brick front and hollow tile and stucco side and rear walls. It will be divided into four rooms, two, and perhaps three, of which will be occupied by Mr. Lamb for his retail and wholesale grocery, fruit and produce business. Mr. Lamb expects to have the building in course of construction in a short time.

North Platte people generally are not aware that the volume of business transacted by Mr. Lamb equals, if it does not exceed, any mercantile house in North Platte. He buys practically everything in car load lots, and receives from two to four car loads each week. In flour, feed and fruits he does considerable wholesaling, not only to local merchants, but to those of other towns. He is now closing out his fifth car of peaches received within thirty days. With his large two story ware house he has ample room to store merchandise in carload lots, and when his proposed new building is completed, his storage capacity will be materially increased. Mr. Lamb expects to largely expand his wholesale business in the future, and may form a corporation for that purpose.

Shad and Cod.

Shad are distributed along the entire east coast of the United States and northward and eastward to the gulf of St. Lawrence. Shad abound in nearly every river of the Atlantic coast. Its migrations from the sea are in quite a regular succession of time from relation to latitude. It first appears in the St. Johns river, Florida, about Nov. 15; in Georgia and South Carolina rivers in January, in the Potomac in February. In the Delaware the maximum run is about May 1, in Maine rivers about a month later, etc. Cod are widely distributed in the north Atlantic ocean. To the north they range far beyond the arctic circle and to the south as far as Cape Hatteras, although they are not common south of New Jersey. The cod in the Pacific ocean is found from Berling sea south to Oregon. The largest cod are found along the Massachusetts coast and from that north—Philadelphia Press.
