INVESTIGATE TRACTOR FOR GRADING COUNTY ROADS.

The county commissioners believe that county road building can be done better, more quickly and much cheaper by the county owning a tractor engine and grading outfit, and to this end they have been investigating tractor engines for a week past. They have visited several places where tractor-propelled graders have been at work, and in each instance they have been very favorably impressed. Each of the tractors were of a different make and the commissioners will take one more trip to see the work of still another make.

These grading outfits cost about three thousand dollars, but the amount of work they can do is really astounding. The idea of the commissioners is to purchase an outfit and place it in the hands of a competent man who will use the outfit in any part of the county where grading is required. This would result in being able to do much more grading each year at a greatly reduced cost, and it is believed will prove a solution of the better roads problem.

MRS. MARTI PASSES AWAY WEDNESDAY

Mrs. Fred Marti, who had been seriously ill for several weeks, died at her home on west Fourth street at nine o'clock Tuesday evening. Death was due to leakage of the heart with which she had suffered for several years. Her condition became critical four weeks ago and a complication of diseases developed which so weakened her system that the services of several physicians and the care of loving relatives could not stay the course of the diseases and at times her sufferings were intense but borne with the fortitude that characterized her whole life. Periods of unconsciousness were frequent, but shortly before she passed away she conversed with those at her bedside and, realizing that the end was near, bade them farewell. To mourn her are left her husband, two sons, Fred and Paul, three daughters, Marjory, Hazel and Mrs. Andy McGovern, of Brady, two brothers, William Miller and Charles Peniston, of Miller, Wyo., five sisters, Mrs. Charles Blood, of Cheyenne, Mrs. W. F. Bennett, of Rock Springs, Mrs. D. R. House, of Rawlins, Mrs. D. D. Markel, of Grand Valley, Colo., and Miss Mollie Peniston, of Rawlins, who has been with her during her illness.

Carrie Elizabeth Peniston was born in this city September 21st, 1872. She spent her girlhood here and on October 18th, 1890; she was married to Fred B. Marti. She was a faithful member of the Episcopal church and took an active part in the Lady Macabbee lodge work. Mrs. Marti was a charitable, christian woman, devoted to her family and home and endeared herself to every acquaintance. Deepest sympathy is extended to the bereaved relatives.

The funeral was held from the Episcopal church yesterday afternoon at 2:30, Rev. Bowker conducting the service in the presence of a large gathering of friends. The floral offerings were many and beautiful.

An Ordinance No. 75.

Providing for the construction of a Sewer Lateral District "G 2" to consist of Blocks No. 1 and 2 of Selby's Addition, Blocks 1 and 2 of Thomson's Addition and Blocks 5 and 12 of the South Park Addition to all of the City of North Platte, Nebraska. Said sewer lateral beginning where the center line of the alley between the south half of block 1, Thomson's Addition and the south half of Block 1 Selby's Addition extended north intersects the main sewer on "A" street, running thence in a southerly direction through the east side of Lot 1, Block 1, in Selby's Addition and on the center line of the alley between Blocks 1 and 2 Thomson's Addition and Blocks 1 and 2 Selby's Addition continued south through the alley of Blocks 5 and 12 South Park Addition to where

the center line of alley intersects the south line of said block 12 in South Park Addition, there to terminate. To be constructed of ten inch sewer pipe from "A" street to the south side of Block 5 in South Park Addition and of eight inch sewer pipe from the south side of Block 5 in South Park Addition to the south side of Block 12 in South Park Addition. Said sewer lateral to be constructed with flush tank, manholes, lampholes and all appliances and to be laid at the proper depth to connect with our present sewer system and to conform with it in all respects and in pursuance to a general ordinance regulating the construction of such sewers.

Section 3. That the City Engineer of said City shall at once prepare and file with the Clerk thereof an estimate of the total costs of said proposed sewer lateral.

Section 4. That after said estimate is prepared and filed, as herein provided, the Clerk of said City shall proceed at once to advertise in manner and form required by law for bids for the construction of said sewer lateral and appliances reserving to said City the right to reject any or all bids therefore.

Section 5. If an approved bid be made for said work, that a contract be therefore entered into by the Mayor of said City, attested by the Clerk, with necessary provisions protecting the interests of said City, upon the contractor furnishing a bond in a sufficient amount for the faithful performance of said contract.

Section 6. To pay the costs of construction of said sewer lateral, flush tank, manholes, lamp holes and appliances, a special assessment shall be levied according to law, against the lots abutting on the lines of said lateral.

Section 7. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.
