NEW BARN BURNS; STRUCK BY LIGHTNING

A new barn on the Garfield Gutherless farm twenty miles northeast of town was struck by lightning Saturday night and burned to the ground. The barn had just been completed at a cost of nine hundred dollars, and upon which Mr. Gutherless had not taken out an insurance policy.

Only part of the contents were saved, the property burned including 150 bushels of corn, some hay, one hog and twenty bundles of shingles.

Lightning early Saturday morning struck the Waldo barn, a half mile east of the city limits and set it on fire. Several men who were sleeping in the barn were awakened by the loud clap of thunder and the shock and promptly extinguished the flames.
