MARRIED AND JOINS CHURCH THEN PASSES AWAY

Mrs. Adolph Vogelsang, nee Ethel Loudon, daughter of Mrs. Frank Sullivan of this city died Saturday evening at half past nine at a local hospital. She was taken ill June 9th with an attack of appendicitis and as her condition became more serious, she was taken to the hospital on Thursday morning where an operation was performed. Friday it was discovered that blood poisoning had set in and hopes of her recovery were abandoned.

Money for Good Roads.

Deputy State Engineer Roy Cochran, of Lincoln, spent last week in this section of the state getting preliminary data for the formation of state aid road districts—or projects as the engineers call them. Under the federal law the funds must be applied as far as possible to post roads and roads that are continuous. Lincoln county is linked with Dawson, Keith and Perkins in a project, and in these counties the aid to be received will be about \$150,000, which, however, will not be available until next year. Lincoln county's share of this aid will be \$66,000, but in return will pay into the state treasury in tax levies the sum of \$19,000, leaving us \$45,000 to "the good." This \$45,000 is a little more than twice the amount Lincoln county levies annually for road purposes.

BIG FLOOD IS DUE HERE NEXT THURSDAY

City Engineer McNamara has been advised by the U. S. reclamation office at Mitchell that a big flood coming down the North Platte river from the Pathfinder dam will reach North Platte Thursday of next week, June 25th. This flood is reckoned at 15,000 second feet, and will raise the water up or a little above the highest point reached by the river ten days ago, or to be exact on June 9th. While this flood will not overflow the river banks, it will bring a high pressure against bridges and bridge fills, and it will probably be necessary, in some instances, to safeguard bridges or fills that were weakened by the former high waters.

Two Ask for Separation.

Gus C. Freed filed suit for divorce from Jaunita Freed in the district court Saturday for abandonment. The petition recites that they were married in October, 1903, at Bluehill and in September, 1909, she willfully and with out cause abandoned him. To this union was born one child Pauline, who is now twelve years of age and in the care of her grandfather P. C. Freed at Portland, Ore. The plaintiff asks that the marriage be annulled and the child be placed in his custody.
Minnie Murphy filed suit for divorce from Clarence L. Murphy in the district court Saturday on the grounds of cruelty. They were married Sept. 4th, 1911, in this city and on Dec. 28th, 1913, the plaintiff says he beat her in such a manner as to break her arm. On March 31st the defendant was found guilty of breaking into a Union Pacific car and sentenced to a term in the state penitentiary. The plaintiff asks that the marriage be annulled.




