URGES RETAIL DEALERS TO POOL ON POTATO BUYING.

Pooled carlot purchases of Nebraska grown and graded potatoes are urged by Gordon W. Wattles, Federal Food Administrator for Nebraska.

Such purchases, says Wattles, will decrease the cost of potatoes and should enable the consumer to buy at less cost. Retailers of the cities and towns of the state are urged to get together and buy Nebraska potatoes and to divide them after shipment.

Investigations by Wattles developed the fact that a large part of the cost of potatoes to the consumer comes from duplicate and unnecessary transportation and from additional expense in handling small shipments.

Every soldier attached to the expeditionary forces, whether in Siberia, France or England, will receive a Christmas label, and package can be sent. Those received and sent before November 20th will get there in time for Christmas. Others may be late but will go just the same.

Sailors can get larger packages direct from their folks without Red Cross inspection. Red Cross Nurses, Y. M. C. A. and kindred organizations can receive Christmas packages through the Red Cross. A carton can be had by the nearest relative, stating it will be the only package received by such welfare worker.

Red Cross Work Must Continue.

In a letter to President Seeberger of the War Council of the American Red Cross says: Let no one suppose that the work of the Red Cross is finished. Millions of American boys are still under arms.

Our soldiers and sailors are enlisted until the commander in chief tells them there is no more work for them to do in the war. Let every Red Cross member and worker show our returning soldiers and sailors that to care for their health, welfare and happiness we are enlisted for no less a period than they are.

The cessation of the war will reveal a picture of misery such as the world has never seen before, especially in the many countries which cannot help themselves. The American people will expect the Red Cross to continue to act as their agent in repairing broken spirits and broken bodies. Peace terms and peace conditions will determine how we may best administer to the vast stricken areas which have been harrowed by the war and in this act of mercy the heart and spirit of the American people must continue to be mobilized through the American Red Cross.

On behalf of the War Council, we cordially ask each member of our loyal body of workers throughout the country to hear in mind the solemn mission which rests upon each one of us. We cannot abate one iota of our efforts or in our spirits. There will be an abundance of work to do even at the moment of peace let our spirits must now call us to the front of our own alone that activities. But that a great duty continues to respond to its obligation to serve mankind.

MUSTERING OUT TO BE BASED ON WAR SERVICE.

Plans for demobilizations of the military and naval forces of the United States now being prepared by the war, navy and labor departments will be submitted soon to President Wilson. Preliminary details of the plan as known Wednesday provided for the mustering out of the men on the basis of length of service and on the ability of trades and occupations to absorb the released men.

American Casualties.

It was officially announced by the war department that the American casualties listed up to noon Monday totaled 69,626, of which number 12,466 were killed in action.

In connection it is stated that thousands of names will be added to this total, as the Americans have seen particularly heavy fighting during the past two weeks and figures on losses during that time are not yet available. It is possible that the total American casualties will reach close to the one hundred thousand mark.

How About Indemnity?

What will the entente allies and their European associates demand from the central powers as reparation for the losses suffered by them in the war and how is Germany prepared to make this reparation? Austria is bankrupt and disintegrating into states which will repudiate the debts of the war makers. These are questions that are receiving a great deal of attention and close study in the national capitol since the signing of the armistice.

The best estimates obtainable at this time show that the cost of the war to the entente allies and their associates, the United States alone excluded, is approximately \$145,000,000,000. The losses thru injury or to demolition of property within the borders of the allies and their associates are estimated at \$68,350,000,000 and the losses at sea of the property, neutral and allied nations, at \$24,000,000,000 more, a total of \$237,350,000,000.
