256 VOTES ARE CAST AT RED CROSS ELECTION.

At the Red Cross election held Wednesday for the purpose of electing fifteen directors, 256 votes were cast, a majority of which were deposited in the ballot box at the Union Pacific round house by employees of the company. Thirty names had been placed in nomination and the fifteen who received the highest vote were: E. F. Seoberger, Mrs. J. S. Simms, Miss Annie Kramph, J. J. Halligan, W. R. Maloney, W. P. Snyder, E. J. Vanderhoof, W. J. O'Connor, Mrs. P. A. Norton, M. E. Scott, Mrs. Charles Bogue, A. P. Kelly, Ira L. Bare, A. W. Shilling and Mrs. Blanche B. Field.

These directors met in the evening, canvassed the vote, announced the result, and then proceeded to the election of officers and members of the executive committee with the following result: E. F. Seoberger, chairman, Mrs. Chas. Bogue vice-chairman, Mrs. J. S. Simms secretary and W. R. Maloney treasurer. Members of the executive committee other than the officers, were elected as follows: Mrs. Chas. Groves, Mrs. W. J. Tiley, Miss Annie Kramph, J. J. Halligan and Ira L. Bare. After taking the matter under consideration for an hour, Mrs. Simms decided that she could not accept the position of secretary, and this position will be filled at a meeting of the executive committee to be held in a few days.

Have 838 Soldier Names.
The committee which for the past two months or more have been compiling a list of the Lincoln County boys who are in the service have secured the names of eight hundred and thirty-eight and additions are still being made. To secure these names has been quite a task, and the end has not been reached. However, the committee is pretty well convinced that an absolutely correct list cannot be secured, and next week will have the names printed and placed in the frame which has already been erected in the court house park.
