## COUNTY NEWS.

### WALLACE

(From the Winner.)

Coveys of prairie chickens can be noticed going over town every day now. The crop of them has been good this year, and now as snow is on the ground they are in search of something to eat.

Corn husking is on in full blast and the tink of the ear can be heard on the side board. Ten cents per bushel is about the average price paid in this locality.

The worst blizzard since the spring of 1914 swept this portion of the country Sunday night and Monday, and Wallace so far as common carriers are concerned, has been cut off from the entire world. Not a train has been able to come through since Saturday, owing to drifts, and after the calm Monday morning Roadmaster Walbridge endeavored to get through with a crew and plow but they succeeded in getting just west of town where they struck a drift twenty feet high and 500 feet long and after working for twelve hours phoned in to town for all possible aid to dig the plow and engine out. All the road's plows save this one, are west, but yesterday one was sent east out of Holyoke. If it were not for the fact the storm was resumed again Monday work would not have been so difficult as when part of the track was cleared it again filled in.
