UNION SERVICES OPEN AT THE BIG TABERNACLE.

The union services opened at the big tabernacle opposite the postoffice Sunday morning under the leadership of Evangelist Jim Rayburn, of Newton, Kansas. In his opening sermon he spoke on "Rebuilding The Wall." He took as his scripture basis the rebuilding of the wall at Jerusalem under Nehemiah.

Preliminary to the sermon an impressive dedication service was led by Rev. Mr. Hess of the Methodist church, the congregation joining him in a response. Rev. Mr. Shenk of the Baptist church led in the dedicatory prayer; after which Rev. Mr. Curry introduced the evangelistic company. Mr. Wickland sang "Open the Gates of the Temple," by Knapp as his opening solo with Mrs. Wickland at the piano.

In his introductory remarks Mr. Rayburn said he wanted it understood by all that the campaign was not in the interest of any one or two churches, but to build up the Kingdom of Christ. He said that all Christian churches of the town would grow as the Kingdom grew. He made it clear that churches that were not in the contract with him were invited to participate in all the services. Protestants and Catholics alike might share in any good thing. He said he had no chip on his shoulder and was after no one. "BUT" said he, "I have a strong gospel to preach, one that I did not write. The only thing I have to do with it is to preach it, not tinker with it nor change it." He read, "Is not my word, saith the Lord, like a fire and like a hammer that breaketh the rocks in pieces?" He said "That's something that burns and something that hits, and before the week is past, someone will get burned and someone hit by the message." He also said that the campaign was waged in Christ's name and must be Christian and must keep sweet. He does not expect to use abusive methods in his work. There will be dignity in all services.

He said that the obstacles which Nehemiah had in rebuilding the wall at Jerusalem are still to be found today in the way of revivals. There were two sets of obstacles then and there are two sets now, namely, the internal and the external. Things wrong with the Jews then and things wrong with church today. The worst things that are ever said or done against our meetings will likely be done by people who profess to be Christians. In spite of the obstacles Nehemiah built the wall.

Lack of co-operation was one obstacle. "But their nobles put not their necks to the work of the Lord." "Not all the nobles died off, some of them or their descendants came to Iowa and perhaps some came to North Platte. Do you know any such nobles, members of the church who will help in the work of the Lord? They say there is too much excitement, they don't believe in it and a dozen other worthless excuses." Poverty of the people was an obstacle that we do not have today. Prosperity is almost a hindrance today.

The enemies of Nehemiah outside of Judahism tried all kinds of schemes to thwart his plans. They tried ridicule, they made fun of the wall by saying, "a fox would break down that wall." Then they tried trickery. "Come down to see us in the town of Ono, but they intended to do him mischief." Then they tried slander. "It is reported that you want to be king." Nehemiah said they were lying and went ahead with his work. Now all these things will try to get in the way of the work here. The work never-the-less will go on, the Lord willing, to a great climax. The motto of the campaign is I Cor. 3:9 "We are workers together with God." Do you like the partnership?

In the evening Rayburn spoke on "Raising the Dead." The threatened storm interfered somewhat with the meeting.

Monday night he spoke on "Revivals How and Why." He said revivals are necessary in all lines of endeavor. We are just now beginning a political revival that will last until in November. It's a good thing. We have business revivals, times of prosperity after times of business decline. Teachers, lawyers, business and tradesmen have times of quickened interest. There are revivals.

Shaking his Bible in the face of his audience, Evangelist Rayburn shouted, "Whatever you may think of religious revivals, or whatever you may say, they are in the Book. I've got the book. If you say you don't believe in revivals you begin at the wrong place, you ought to say you don't believe the book."

On Wednesday Mr. Rayburn will speak on "Christ An Agitator." He will bring out some characteristics of the life of Christ that are rarely mentioned.

On Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays at 2:30 there will be Bible study and lectures at the Tabernacle. Bring your Bible and enjoy yourself reading with Rayburn.

ROAD NOTICE.

To Whom It May Concern:

The Special Road Commissioner appointed to view and report upon the practicability of the vacation of that portion of the public road in the Northwest quarter of the Northeast quarter of Section thirty-one, in Township fourteen North of Range thirty West of the Sixth Principal Meridian, described as follows: From the intersection of the center line of the south main track of the Union Pacific Railroad Company, as now located, constructed, maintained and operated, with the east line of said Section thirty-one, measure northwesterly along said center line of main track a distance of seventeen hundred fifty-six and one-eighth feet to a point, thence northwesterly, at right angles to said center line of main track, a distance of one hundred feet to the point of beginning, said point of beginning being in the northerly right of way line of said Railroad Company and also being in the westerly line of that certain north and south county road, which said county road is described as a strip of land sixty-six feet in width and approximately ninety-four rods in length in that certain quit-claim deed dated July 19th, 1919, from Louisa M. Cody and husband to Lincoln County, Nebraska, recorded in the records of Lincoln County in Book B-3, at Page 76; thence northerly along said westerly line of that certain north and south county road and at right angles to said center line of main track a distance of sixty-six feet to a point, thence northwesterly, parallel with and one hundred sixty-six feet distant northeasterly at right angles, from said center line of main track a distance of four hundred twenty-three and five tenths feet to a point, thence westerly, along a straight line a distance of two hundred sixty-four and eight tenths feet to a point which is in said northerly right of way line and six hundred eighty feet distant northwesterly from the point of beginning when measured along said northerly right of way line and one hundred feet distant northeasterly from said center line of main track, when measured at right angles thereto; thence southwesterly, along said northerly right of way line, parallel with and one hundred feet distant northeasterly, at right angles, from said center line of main track a distance of six hundred eighty feet to the point of beginning, has filed his report in favor of such vacation.

And the said Special Road Commissioner appointed to view and report upon the practicability of establishing in lieu of the public road petitioned to be vacated as above described, a public road in the Northwest quarter of the Northeast quarter of said Section thirty-one, has filed his report in favor of the establishment of a public road described as follows: Beginning at a point on the west line of Section 31, T. 14, R. 30 W. of the 6th P. M., 215 feet north of a point in the center line of the Union Pacific Original Main Track, measured at a right angle, which said point is 175 1/2 feet westerly from the east line of said Section 31, measured on the center line of said track, running northwesterly parallel with said railroad track 355 feet, thence southwesterly 229 feet to connect again with center line of Road No. 2. The foregoing notes describe the center line of proposed road.

All objections to such vacation and establishment, or claims for damages, must be filed in the County Clerk's office of Lincoln County, Nebraska, on or before noon of the 7th day of August, A. D. 1920, or such road will be vacated and established without reference thereto.
