### ORDINANCE NO. \_\_\_\_\_

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE SUBMITTING TO THE ELECTORS OF THE CITY AND NORTH PLATTE, IN THE COUNTY OF LINCOLN, IN THE STATE OF NEBRASKA, THE FOLLOWING QUESTION, TO-WIT: "SHALL THE CITY OF NORTH PLATTE, IN LINCOLN COUNTY, STATE OF NEBRASKA, ISSUE ITS 'CITY OF NORTH PLATTE WATER WORKS IMPROVEMENT BONDS' IN THE SUM OF FIFTY THOUSAND 00-100 (\$50,000.00) DOLLARS FOR THE PURPOSE OF RAISING MONEY FOR THE IMPROVING, EXTENDING AND MAINTAINING THE WATER WORKS OF SAID CITY AND THE BUILDING AND CONSTRUCTING OF ADDITIONAL WELL OR WELLS, PUMP-HOUSES AND INSTALLING PUMPS AND MOTORS AND EXTENDING RE-LAYING AND ENLARGING WATER MAINS IN SAID CITY IN ACCORDANCE WITH PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS AND ESTIMATES ON FILE WITH THE CITY CLERK, AND TO PROVIDE FOR THE LEVYING AND COLLECTING, BY THE PROPER OFFICERS OF SAID CITY, A TAX ANNUALLY, TO PAY THE INTEREST AND PRINCIPAL OF SAID BONDS AS THEY MATURE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE Mayor and City Council of the City of North Platte, Lincoln County, State of Nebraska:

Section 1. That a special election shall be held in said city of North Platte, Lincoln County, Nebraska, on the 19th day of October, 1920, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the voters of said City: "Shall the Mayor and City Council of the City of North Platte, Lincoln County, State of Nebraska, issue Fifty Thousand 00-100 (\$50,000.00) Dollars, of the 'City of North Platte Water Works Improvements Bonds,' in the denomination of One Thousand 00-100 (\$1,000.00) Dollars, each bearing interest at the rate of 6 per cent per annum, payable semi-annually interest and principal, payable at the office of the County Treasurer of Lincoln County, State of Nebraska, said bonds to bear date of October 1, 1920, and the interest on said bonds to be payable on the first day of April, 1921, and on the 1st day of October, 1921, and on the 1st day of April and the 1st day of October of each and every year thereafter until all of the interest on said bonds shall have been paid. Said bonds to be numbered consecutively from 1 to 50 inclusive and the interest thereon to be evidenced by coupons thereto attached.

Bonds Nos. 1 to 5 inclusive to become due and payable on the 1st day of October, 1930.

Bonds Nos. 6 to 10 inclusive to become due and payable on the 1st day of October, 1931.

Bonds Nos. 11 to 15 inclusive to become due and payable on the 1st day of October, 1932.

Bonds Nos. 16 to 20 inclusive to become due and payable on the 1st day of October, 1933.

Bonds Nos. 21 to 25 inclusive to become due and payable on the 1st day of October, 1934.

Bonds Nos. 26 to 30 inclusive to become due and payable on the 1st day of October, 1935.

Bonds Nos. 31 to 35 inclusive to become due and payable on the 1st day of October, 1936.

Bonds Nos. 36 to 40 inclusive to become due and payable on the 1st day of October, 1937.

Bonds Nos. 41 to 45 inclusive to become due and payable on the 1st day of October, 1938.

Bonds Nos. 46 to 50 inclusive to become due and payable on the 1st day of October, 1939.

And the said City shall have and reserves the option to pay any of said bonds at any time after ten years from the date thereof, and shall the City of North Platte, Lincoln County, Nebraska levy a tax in the year 1921 and each and every year thereafter sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds, and in the year 1921 and each and every year thereafter sufficient to create a sinking fund to pay the principal of said bonds as they become due until sufficient tax has been levied to pay all of the interest and principal of said bonds and such tax, both for principal and interest, to be levied upon all of the taxable property in said City of North Platte, Lincoln County, State of Nebraska.

Said bonds to be used for the purpose of raising money for the improving, extending and maintaining of the Water Works of said City and building and constructing of additional well or wells, pump-houses and purchasing and installing pumps and motors and extending, re-laying

and enlarging the water mains in said City of North Platte, Lincoln County, State of Nebraska.

Section 2. The ballots to be used in said election shall have printed thereon:

"FOR" issuing Fifty Thousand 00-100 (\$50,000.00) Dollars of the City of "North Platte Water Works Improvement Bonds" in denominations of One thousand 00-100 (\$1,000.00) Dollars each, bearing interest at the rate of 6 per cent per annum payable semi-annually, interest and principal payable at the office of the County Treasurer of Lincoln County, State of Nebraska. Said bonds to bear date of October 1, 1920, and the interest on said bonds to be payable on the 1st day of April, 1921 and on the 1st day of October, 1921, and on the 1st day of April and the 1st day of October of each and every year thereafter until all of the interest on said bonds shall have been paid; to levy a tax in the year 1921 and each and every year thereafter sufficient to pay the interest and principal of said bonds as they become due until sufficient tax has been levied to pay all of the principal and interest of said bonds, such tax both for principal and interest to be levied upon all of the taxable property in said City of North Platte, Lincoln County, Nebraska.

Section 3. Those voting in favor of said proposition shall mark their ballot with "X" after paragraph beginning with the word "For." Those voting against said proposition shall mark their ballot with an "X" after the paragraph beginning with the word "Against" issuing \$50,000.00 of the City of "North Platte Water Works Improvements Bonds" in denomination of One Thousand 00-100 (\$1,000.00) Dollars each bearing interest at the rate of 6 per cent per annum payable semi-annually, interest and principal payable at the office of the County Treasurer of Lincoln County, State of Nebraska, said bonds to bear date of October 1st, 1920, and the interest on said bonds to be payable on the 1st day of April, 1921, and on the 1st day of October, 1921, and on the 1st day of April and the first day of October of each and every year thereafter until all of the interest on said bonds shall have been paid and against levying a tax in the year 1921 and each and every year thereafter sufficient to pay the interest and principal of said bonds as they become due until sufficient taxes has been levied to pay all of the principal and interest of said bonds, such tax both for principal and interest to be levied upon all of the taxable property of the said city of North Platte, Lincoln County, Nebraska.

Section 4. Notice of said election shall be given by the publication of a notice thereof in the North Platte Telegraph and in the North Platte Semi-Weekly Tribune, the former being a weekly newspaper and the latter a semi-weekly newspaper, both printed and published in the City of North Platte, Lincoln County, Nebraska, and of general circulation in said County, each of said newspapers having been designated as the official papers of said City; said notice to be published for at least five weeks prior to said date of election and the City Clerk is hereby instructed to cause publication of said notice to be made.

Section 5. Said election will be open at 8 o'clock in the morning and continue open until 8 o'clock in the afternoon of said day of election.

Section 6. The polling places of said election will be at the A. N. Durbin Garage, at the intersection of 5th and Dewey Streets in the First ward in said City; and in the District Court room in the County Court House, in the Second ward in said City; and at the City Hall in the Third ward in said City; and the North Platte Buick Garage Company at the intersection of Locust and 8th Streets in said City in the Fourth ward; or such other place as may be designated in the notice calling said election; said election will be conducted in manner and form as provided by the Ordinances of said City and the Statutes of the State of Nebraska.

Section 7. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication as required by law.


