

UNION PACIFIC MEDICINE BOW CUTOFF TO BE BUILT THIS YEAR.

The Union Pacific Railroad Company has asked permission of the Interstate Commerce Commission to extend its line of double track from Haig, Nebr., to Medicine Bow, Wyo. This means that the through trains will go from North Platte to O'Fallons, then take the North River line through Lewellen, Oshkosh, Northport, Gering, etc. It will leave Cheyenne and Laramie off the main line. The cut off will shorten the main line by many miles and Gering will probably be made a division point. Train crews on the main line will have to stay over at Gering instead of Sidney. A joint meeting of the Nebraska Railroad Commission and the Wyoming Public Utilities Commission will be held at Gering next Tuesday to pass upon the proposed route. The above information is contained in quite lengthy items in the Bee for the 28th and the Journal for the 29th.

TODAY'S GEOGRAPHY A NEW WEEKLY FEATURE OF THE FRIDAY TRIBUNE.

Each Friday issue of the Tribune will contain three columns of up-to-date material about the geography of the world today. This will enable the readers to keep pace with the changing map of the world. These columns will contain stories about new and old countries, new and old peoples and strange places. The material is furnished through the National Geographic Society at Washington. This society is an association for the increase and diffusion of geographic knowledge. It was founded in 1888. It publishes every month the National Geographic Magazine (1,600 to 2,000 pages annually) and many large maps; gives an annual series of thirty addresses, and assists worthy projects of exploration. It has been associated with even arctic explorations, notably those of Admiral Peary, and has sent expeditions to Alaska, Mount Pelee, Peru and previously unexplored portions of South America. So important were the activities of the society during and following the great war that its membership increased from about 210,000 in 1913 to about 500,000 today.

The Geographic News Bulletin (for schools) was started in the fall of 1919 by the society from a fund set aside for the diffusion of geographic knowledge after many requests had come from teachers that its newspaper bulletins be made available for school use. For some years the society had been issuing to a selected list of newspapers a series of bulletins dealing with the geographic and historic backgrounds of current events. This service became especially popular during the war.
