The Local Navy Recruiting Station is interested in an announcement made by Secretary Daniels that he has just issued instructions to the Commander-in-Chief of the Atlantic fleet and to the Commander-in-Chief of the Pacific fleet to submit tentative itineraries for the foreign cruises to be made by the respective fleets during next summer. The present idea seems to be for the Atlantic fleet to visit

ports on the east coast of South America and also Cape Town and possibly the island of St. Helena, the home of Napoleon during his banishment. The Pacific fleet is expected to visit the South Sea Island and ports in Australia and New Zealand. The local station is taking men for the navy, last week, showing twenty-three hundred enlistments in the whole country. The contemplated trip offers a fine opportunity for men to see the world.
