COMMUNITY PUBLICITY

Conducted by the CHAMBER OF COMMERCE.

The Chamber of Commerce will offer a purse of \$250 for the best collective exhibits of farm produce from Lincoln County precincts at the Lincoln County Fair, next September. This purse will be divided into three moneys: \$125 for the best collective exhibit from any one precinct; \$75 for the second best and \$50 for the third best. This money will be deposited in a local bank July 1st to the credit of S. M. Souder, treasurer of the Fair Association and by him turned over to the prize winners.

City Engineer Rannie has promised an early report of the cost of the proposed drainage system which would take care of the water that comes from the west and floods the city streets during heavy rains, and which would also lower the water table and solve the problem of having basements fill with water. This drainage proposition was taken up by the Chamber of Commerce last year and the committee, of which E. F. Seiberger is chairman, had a survey made by Union Pacific engineers acting in conjunction with the city engineer and engineer Roy Cochran. This report was filed with the city council and that body directed the city engineer to make a report on the estimated cost. Owing to a burden of other work City Engineer Rannie has been unable to reach this work, but now promises an estimate in the near future.

Through the efforts of Secretary C. F. Coy, of the Paxton Commercial Club, Train No. 16 now stops on flag at Paxton, Sutherland and Hershey. This order became effective yesterday. Residents of those towns can now reach North Platte at 9:20 in the morning and return on No. 17 at 6:25 in the evening, thus giving them the entire day in which to transact business.

A Lincoln man writes the secretary that he is looking for a location for an auto top business and another man in Kansas wants information relative to the prospects for an auto radiator shop.

Last week the secretary received letters from eight men residing in nearly as many different states inquiring about real estate values in North Platte and stating that they were looking for new locations.

A list of traveling men who make North Platte their headquarters, including those who travel for local houses, has been compiled by the secretary. The list shows thirty-seven names. Several of these men were interviewed Saturday evening and each reported that he found business improving, a decided change for the better having taken place since January first.

Gen'l. Manager Jeffers writes the secretary that he does not deem it advisable to locate the proposed live stock sales pavilion on the Union Pacific right of way on North Locust Street as it is felt that such ground will be needed for track extension in the near future.

W. J. O'Connor and the secretary attended a meeting of the Paxton Commercial Club Wednesday evening and heard read a report of the doings of the club since its organization in June 1920. The report was a most flattering one, and gave evidence that the club is an exceedingly active one. At this meeting the membership of the club was increased from thirty to fifty nine. Short addresses were made by Mr. O'Connor, A. B. Hoagland and the secretary.

SHIPPING HOGS WEST.

Ed Todenhoft, the local hog buyer shipped six cars of hogs to San Francisco Sunday, and placed in the cars sufficient corn to feed the animals while in transit. Mr. Todenhoft has contracted to deliver to the San Francisco buyer many cars of hogs, in fact a whole trainload, and in order to fill the contract is compelled to ship in from Central Nebraska a number of cars of the animals as the local supply up to date has been insufficient. The hogs purchased outside the North Platte territory are assembled here and then shipped out with those locally purchased. In filling this western contract Mr. Todenhoft says he can't afford to pay farmers and hay growers a higher price than he could were he to ship to the South Omaha market.
As all the grain necessary to feed the hogs in transit is being purchased in North Platte it assists in creating a local market for corn. Last week he purchased twenty tons of corn.
