LOST CITY—Last Chapter

HIGH SPOTS IN THE REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF CHAMBER OF COMMERCE.

Following are extracts from the report made by Ira L. Bare, Secretary of the North Platte Chamber of Commerce, to the membership of the Chamber at the banquet held Tuesday, March 22:

"The Chamber of Commerce, in January, assisted in the organization of the Lincoln County Farm Bureau. Men from this organization took an active part in getting the movement under way and then dropped out as was proper.

In the organization of the Pure Bred Live Stock Association in January, the Chamber of Commerce gave material assistance. Our vice-president, Mr. Romigh, was selected as one of the committee to secure plans for the pavilion and other members have given valuable help. The Chamber will help entertain the 100 or more prospective buyers who will attend the first sale of pure bred livestock which will be held next month.

The Chamber of Commerce has prepared a bill which will increase the maximum amount of bonds which the city can vote for water purposes from \$150,000 to \$250,000. This bill has passed the Senate and is certain to pass the House and become a law.

A committee from the Chamber of Commerce appeared before the City Council and urged that body to take action on the proposed drainage system to take care of the surface water which floods the city. A part of the plan has been adopted and bids are now being advertised for the construction of some of the proposed system.

After considerable correspondence with the Union Pacific officials, the company is now building a loading chute at the old stock yards for the use of hog and cattle dealers. It is needed by stock exhibitors and by dealers.

Men from the Chamber of Commerce attended the meeting of the dairymen this month and the Secretary was appointed as a member of the committee to work toward the organization of a dairymen's association and the appointment of a milk inspector for the city of North Platte.

Directors of the Chamber of Commerce appeared before the City Council and secured leave from that body to change the city dump grounds from the west side of the North river bridge to the east side with a view of protecting the river bank which has washed away at least forty feet of earth within the past 20 years. This action was done in conjunction with the City Park Commission.

The organization has worked with Representative Davis to secure a State Fish Hatchery for western Nebraska and the bill appropriating \$10,000 as a start on the project will probably pass the legislature soon. The hatchery is to be located in either Lincoln or Garden Counties with the chances in favor of its location near North Platte.

W. E. Shuman was sent to Lincoln as a representative of the Chamber of Commerce and he in co-operation with M. E. Crosby, City Attorney of North Platte, appeared before the Committee considering the bill which placed the regulation of privately owned public utilities in the hands of the Railway Commission instead of the City Council. The bill was killed in the committee.

The Chamber of Commerce has appropriated \$150 to the Poultry Association for its annual midwinter exhibition. It showed its appreciation of the commercial travelers who make North Platte their headquarters by giving them a banquet last month. It has already made extensive plans for helping to entertain the State Convention of the Order of the Eastern Star which meets here next month. 600 delegates are expected.

The Chamber of Commerce has purchased and distributed five hundred Farm account books which were gotten out by the State Agricultural School with a view to help farmers keep accounts so they would have the facts for their income tax reports. Several hundred little booklets telling about North Platte have been distributed from the Secretary's office.

The Chamber of Commerce is not to have charge of the County Fair because it has been turned over to the farmers, but the Chamber will cooperate in every way possible and has offered special prizes amounting to \$250 for the best precinct collective exhibits.

Other matters on which the Directors are working at the present time include investigations of hydro-electric plant for the Birdwood, pump irrigation, daily bulletins of weather conditions for tourists, tourist camp grounds, good road maintenance, permanent headquarters for the Commercial Travelers and other improvements and advancements of a more or less public character.
