EDITORIAL.

The appointment of Sidney S. Spillner as Chief of Police of North Platte has met with general favor. As First Lieutenant of Company E, he made good and, since his return from the war he took up his old trade and settled down to the ways of peace with the determination to make good there. Mayor Evans is to be congratulated on the selection of a man who gives promise of making an efficient officer and one who can be relied upon by all classes to uphold the law and protect North Platte against law breakers.

His duties are told will be to superintend the construction work on the city's water works system and any paving, sewer or water construction or repairing which may be undertaken in the future. McNamara as consulting engineer and Frank Kroehler as Superintendent of Construction it looks as though the present administration is prepared to do business if the people will give it the power.

NOT ALL MEN WHO ARE RIDING THE FREIGHT TRAINS TODAY ARE BUMS.

Here is a letter received by J. B. Payne in charge of the People's Mission Free Lunch. It was unsolicited and came as a result of his having given the writer of the letter a good meal of warm food and a hearty hand-clasp. Here is the letter:

To Mission Supporters:
Out of heartfelt gratitude I wish to thank Mr. Payne and Mr. Flynn and those who support the People's Mission for what they did for me and to speak a word of the grand work done by them. Like thousands of other men I am out of work at the present and have been traveling around in search of same for the past five weeks. At last I have been offered back my old place at Fort Dodge, Iowa and will be at work there next week.

I got into North Platte with 25c and after paying for my breakfast it was a case of going hungry, beg or steal. I was brought up right and learned never to steal. I never have begged before and have never tramped so I went to the Mission and was welcomed there. My case is not alone for I find that of the thousands of men traveling around, 95 per cent are in the same class and are honest working men looking for work. Perhaps the other five per cent are tramps who will not work but they never mix and seldom if ever take in Missions as they are looking for pork chops, steak or chicken and get it while us working men are glad to get anything without begging. We are not on the road for pleasure by any means and many of us have families. I myself have a wife and two children which I had to leave for a time to seek work or allow the County to keep us. I am now going to work and will remember the Mission and the good people of North Platte and will gladly repay what I have received. The People's Mission is doing a grand work in looking after the floating class who are not tramps but unemployed men, many of them going hungry days at a time rather than beg or steal.

It saves the trouble of being begged upon the street or the home or the stores. For while the Mission takes care of the working class only the real tramps will beg others and these should be turned down at every point.
