EDITORIAL.

Eight pages of home print this issue and every one worth reading.

The installment of Bull-dog Drummond was omitted from this issue through a change of plans. It will follow in later issues.

The editor has to apologize every morning for not attending from one to three meetings of some kind which were held the night before. On Tuesday evening we had company at our home at dinner, we were invited to go to a picture show, we had promised to attend the lecture at the Keith, we were expected at the special meetings at our own church and we had to take part in a band concert. In addition this office and shop was over-

flowing with work that was pressing and some of which had to be done that night. There being only one of us, we went to the band concert and then to the office. We missed the picture show, the lecture, the church meeting and the company, all of which we very much regret. We confess that Tuesday was a little beyond the usual offerings but every night it is a choice of some kind and we are ashamed to say that occasionally we choose to stay at home with our family. Don't talk to the editor about North Platte being a 'dead town.'

The other day a Union Pacific brakeman called at our office and gave vent to his feelings in some pretty forceful if inelegant language. We were not present and it was not repeated to us word for word but we got the idea. He was mad because we were supporting Brother Payne of the People's Mission in his effort to feed the hungry men, who come through North Platte. He is said to have complained that the brakemen were having trouble with these men and that they should be shown no favors by anyone who was in sympathy with the brakemen. We had already been thinking of that side of the question and our sympathies were entirely with the brakemen.

Some of the men going through are bums and toughs. They resort to violence without cause or provocation. They are a very few in number but they must be reckoned with. It is estimated that they are less than five per cent. The other ninety-five per cent out of work, would work if they had a chance. It is true as Brother Payne says that they have been improvident and have spent their good wages but they are to be reckoned with and must be helped. It is said that a majority of the men now going through on the freight trains are union men carrying paid-up membership cards. When Engineer Cox became convinced of this he went out and collected money to carry on the work of the Mission. Other union men of the city have helped their traveling brother craftsmen by donations of money and supplies. We certainly feel for the train officials who are required to face single-handed the crowds of men who sometimes assail a single train and clamber aboard. Their orders are to clear the cars of men, but they get only curses and sometimes rough treatment for their efforts. They stand between the company determined to collect fares and the men determined to ride free. We cannot advise them as to what they should do and we do not blame them for getting sore at the "bums," but after these men have reached North Platte we believe every brakeman and his wife and family will be safer if we give the "bums" a meal and send them on. It is partly a matter of protection that we feed hungry men for hunger drives some to desperation. Then it is humane. We must not class all of these men with the worst. We hope the brakeman who made the complaint will never come to the point where he will have to ride the bumpers, but if he should, we hope there will be a Brother Payne or a Brother Flynn at each meal time to give him a dinner and a word of encouragement as he goes on his way.
