His sire, Dandy, was a champion at several state fairs in 1912-13. Also his brother, Dixon, was grand champion bull at 1909 International at Chicago.

The First National bank of this city did not open for business on Wednesday of this week. This institution is not insolvent and it is believed from careful inquiry by The Telegraph, that its temporary closing was because of the slow liquidation of its vapor.

The farmers were not in a position to pay their agricultural obligations due the bank, and the current demands were such that the deposits gradually reduced until the bank's reserve was impaired.

We understand steps will be taken immediately to re-organize the bank. It is not because of mismanagement or bad paper held by the bank, but merely a question of slow liquidation, which is not peculiar to this locality alone. The general depression throughout the country universally contributes to financial strain, yet Sidney's financial institutions are on a solid foundation and will recover from decline in prices and be back to a normal condition perhaps more speedily than any other section of the state.—Sidney Telegraph.



The State Legislature has just passed a law authorizing school districts in Nebraska to consolidate so that rural pupils will have the same educational advantages as those of the cities. In view of this fact I have planned and designed a school building that will meet all the necessary requirements of any school district that is contemplating erecting such a structure. The plans call for a combined grade school and high school under one roof. There are three entrances. In the basement there is a large gymnasium with raised balconies for spectators, manual training department with storage room, boys and girls toilet, boiler and fuel room, corridors wherein locker space is available. The first floor consists of four grade rooms, lunch room and Superintendent's office which can be used as a class room if desired. The second floor has an assembly room with stage so arranged that it can be used for domestic science, agricultural and science laboratory department and a library. Each grade room in the building, of which there are five, has a large wardrobe, and a drinking fountain is provided for each floor. The building has a complete system of ventilation.

The above picture is a perspective of the exterior design of the building. I wish to say that these drawings are on file in my office and I will be pleased to take the project up with district boards and go into detail further in the matter.
