EDITORIAL

We learn from A. R. Dumphrey, superintendent of the central division of the air mail service that this division of the service made a new record during January 1922 of 94.3 performance of schedule mileage. The eastern division made only 87.4 and the Western division 79.0. The record for last week was 100 per cent on the Central division.

The present conditions in business have brought out some of the finest traits of character and conduct that can be found in any age. One of these came to our notice yesterday. We were told that the employees of one of the local barber shops are in turn each taking a day off rather than have one of their number let out. This means a reduced pay check for each man but all are at work. It expresses the finest type of brotherhood—that which touches the pocket book.

Elsewhere is printed the constitution of the Student Council of the Senior High school. It is an excellent document and well worth the reading. Parents of High school students can gain somewhat of the ideas of the students by noting the orderly arrangement of the organization and the systematic way in which it is organized for democracy. It does not take away any of the responsibility of the teachers but organizes to assist them.

Considerable interest about town has been centered on an unusual case that comes from the Washington school. It seems that Thomas Eggers, age 28, deprived of an education during his early years made financial arrangements so that he could go to school this winter and applied for admission to review the work of the lower grades. He was admitted tentatively and paid his tuition, taking his place in the opportunity room with the boys and girls of the lower grades. So much complaint was received on account of the crowded condition of the schools and for other reasons that the tuition was returned and Mr. Eggers was notified that he would not be able to stay in the grade school. Meanwhile he had made financial arrangements basing his ideas, so he says, on the assurance of his friends that he was entitled to the schooling if he paid tuition. It is an unusual condition and one which is rather difficult to settle without doing an injustice to someone.
