## POLITICAL DOPE ON THE COMING ELECTION

COMMENT ON WHAT THE CANDIDATES ARE DOING FOR THEMSELVES

Bob Simmons will be here Saturday at the Fireman's hall at 3 o'clock. All the women of North Platte are invited to hear his address.

The addresses by Senator Randall and Mrs. Hight on next Tuesday evening will be at the county court house. This announcement has just been received.

Senator Norris is scheduled to speak at North Platte on Monday, October 30. The hour and place will be announced later. Senator Norris is not a candidate for office this year but is campaigning in the interests of the republicans who are candidates. It is expected that he will make one of the strongest speeches to be made by the republicans this campaign.

Senator Hitchcock gave a very interesting address at the Keith Theatre last Tuesday evening. He spoke of national affairs mostly, only introducing his remarks with a short reference to state politics. He dwelt on the money question and the tariff, condemning the new tariff bill in very strong terms and blaming the republican party with the deflation of prices. A good crowd greeted his remarks with close attention, very few leaving before he had closed. A circle of leading democrats including a number of ladies, backed him up on the platform and gave a strong local color to the address. John J. Halligan presided with his usual dignity and pleasing manner.

The candidacy of Theo. Lowe for county clerk is gaining force each day. The railroad men are said to be for him because they know him so well and know what he is. One yard man said yesterday that "Pete" would get 90 per cent of the votes of North Platte railroad men. Continuing he said, "We know how careful he is in his work. We know he has a conscience back of him in all he does. He is old enough to have mature judgment and yet not too old to be progressive." A Union Pacific official was approached last night and spoke very favorably of him. Theodore Lowe has had to work for what he has and knows the problems of the laboring man. He is not going to be extravagant with the people's money when he gets into the county clerk's office.

## NOTED SPECIALIST TO VISIT THIS COUNTY

DR. CAROLINE B. HEDGER OF CHICAGO SPENDS TWO DAYS HERE

Dr. Caroline B. Hedger of Chicago, noted child specialist from the Elizabeth McCormick Memorial Foundation is to spend one day in Lincoln county next week. The University Extension service has secured Dr. Hedger for two lectures on Wednesday October 25th. At two o'clock she will speak at Brady and at 8 p. m. at Sutherland. At 3:30 in the afternoon she is to address the state convention of Woman's Clubs held at North Platte.

The extension Service has done much toward improving live stock conditions in the state but considers the improvement of the conditions of childhood as much more important although not so much has been done heretofore along that line. Dr. Hedger was in Nebraska for a week last January and the demand was so persistent for her services in different parts of the state that her return was arranged for and October was the earliest date she could come.

One of the problems which Dr. Hedger is attempting to solve is that of the malnourished child. She said she has always hoped she might find a "skinny" child who was perfectly well but she has not been able to find one yet. The malnourished child, besides his underweight condition, is pale, has dark lines under the eyes, his muscles are flabby and ofttimes he is a mouth breather. He may have projecting shoulder blades, a stooping posture, a prominent abdomen or curvature of the spine. He is nervous, restless, inattentive, forgetful and often irritable and contrary. Dr. Hedger, through the physical examination of an underweight child, demonstrates some of the reasons why the child is unable to gain as does his playmates. Every mother should hear one of these addresses and they are all free.
