CHRISTMAS SEALS ARE PUT ON SALE

LOCAL ORGANIZATION IS GIVING SERVICE THROUGH STAMP SALE

The local council of the Camp Fire girls is making a canvass of the business and residential sections of the city in the interests of selling Christmas Seals. This is done without any reward or pay of any kind and in accord with the Campfire plan for rendering a service to the community. One half of the funds obtained through the sale of the stamps will go to promote some health work in this community but not a cent goes to the campfire girls in any way. The seals are for use at the holiday season and carry the Christmas spirit with each package or letter which bears one of them. North Platte has done well in the past in the sale of Christmas seals and the record stands to be topped by the seals this year. The proceeds which are sent to the Nebraska Tuberculosis Association are used in fighting the terrible white plague in this state.

LINCOLN COUNTY OVERSUBSCRIBES UNIVERSITY STADIUM QUOTA

The Lincoln county committee which had charge of raising funds for the University of Nebraska stadium fund has made its report which shows the quota of \$1500 has been oversubscribed 30%. The total raised to date is \$1,907.25. This amount was subscribed by graduates and former students of the university with but two exceptions. The chairman of the committee was R. L. Cochran and to him and his associates is given the credit for over-subscription of the sixth largest quota in the state outside of Lincoln and Omaha. Following are the contributors:

PAVING PROGRAM IS COMPLETED FOR YEAR

LARGEST CONTRACT EVER LET IN NEBRASKA IS FINISHED ON TIME

North Platte has just finished its greatest year of paving. There is a piece about a block long on west 6th street which has not yet set so that it will not be done now until spring. The street will be opened in a few days so that travel will not be interrupted but the top will be laid later. Not counting this unfinished section the past season has seen just ninety blocks of paving completed. This is said to be the largest contract ever given to one firm of paving contractors by any city in one year. The Abel Construction Co. of Lincoln has done the work and has given general satisfaction. It has contracts for two districts of sixteen or more blocks for the coming summer and other districts are in process of formation. The city has just completed a general cleanup of the paving and the appearance is very satisfactory. Chas. J. McNamara has had charge of the engineering problems in behalf of the city and has completed the task with credit. Geo. M. Rannie is city engineer.

PLANS ARE BEING MADE FOR COMING HIGH SCHOOL DEBATE SEASON
