


Exclusive Pictures of Amundsen in Arctic Snows Making Ready for Air Trip to North Pole.

FARMERS BEING GIVEN AIDS TO MARKETING WHEAT WISELY

To enable farmers and local grain buyers to meet more satisfactorily the conditions under which wheat is handled and graded when it reaches the terminal market, the extension services of Minnesota, North Dakota and South Dakota, cooperating with representatives of the United States Department of Agriculture, are conducting a "Know Your Own Wheat" campaign. During the first 10 days of the campaign, schools were held at Fargo, N. Dak., and Brookings, S. Dakota, where specialists in handling and grading wheat gave instructions to county agents from the three States.

Following this preliminary work, local meetings of one or two days each are being held in wheat-producing counties where the county agents assisted by the specialists assigned for the campaign, are demonstrating directly to farmers and local grain buyers the best methods of handling and grading wheat for shipment to terminal market. Grain-grading apparatus has been supplied to 10 counties in each of the three States, for use under the direction of the county agents and specialists conducting the work.

It is planned to have farmers and buyers attend the same meetings so that both may have like information regarding methods of handling and grading. A representative of the department recently spent three weeks assisting in the campaigns.

EXTENSION TO ROAD NO. 418

The special commissioner appointed to locate a public road as follows:

Beginning at the Southeast corner east corner of Section Thirty-two, of Section Twenty-nine and the North-township eleven and range thirty-two; thence running west one mile between sections twenty-nine and thirty-two, along said section line, thence South between Sections thirty-one and thirty-two to the South line of township eleven, thence south between sections five and six and seven and eight, seventeen and eighteen to the South line of Section Seventeen, thence east about eight rods between sections seventeen and twenty in township ten, range thirty-two, all in Lincoln county and State of Nebraska, the above described road to be 66 ft. wide.

Any or all parties having objections thereto or claims for damages by reason of the establishment of the said above described road must file same in the office of the County Clerk of Lincoln County, Nebraska, on or before 12 o'clock noon of the 19th day of Feb. A. D. 1923.

Hobart as judge of the Seventeenth judicial district, announced by Governor McKelvie, means the rise to the bench of Mr Barron after but four years of practice. He was graduated from the state university, with Phi Beta Kappa honors and later taught Latin and Greek there. He was an editorial writer for the Omaha World-Herald, and coming to this county in 1906, established the Scotts-bluff Star, a weekly paper. He began the practice of law in Scotts-bluff in 1918. He has been active locally in republican politics.




