Election in Nemaha.

A good vote was being in Nemaha election day, 228 votes being cast. Last year the vote was 210. The republicans had a majority for everything except overseers in districts 33 and 34. H L Hayward, J W Armstrong and H T Minick got the largest vote on the republican ticket, each receiving 131 votes. Casner Barnes came next with 130. On the fusion ticket Edgar Ferneau was the highest man and T H Gillan the next highest, receiving 102 and 97 votes respectively. The following is the vote in detail:

For governor—Hayward 131; Poynter 95. Hayward's majority 36.
Lieutenant governor—Murphy 126; Gilbert 96. Murphy's majority 30.

Secretary of state—Duras 127; Porter 95. Duras' majority 32.

Treasurer—Mortensen 126; Meserve 96. Mortensen's majority 30.

Superintendent—Saylor 127; Jackson 96; Saylor's majority 31.

Attorney general—Jackson 127; Smyth 94. Jackson's majority 33.

Commissioner of public lands—Williams 126; Wolfe 95. Williams' majority 31.

Congressman—Burkett 128; Manahan 95. Burkett's majority 33.

Senator—Barton 125; Gillan 97. Barton's majority 28.

Float representative—Berlet 127; Nestor 94. Berlet's majority 33.

Representatives—Armstrong 131; Shafer 125; Jones 91; Swan 92. Armstrong's majority 49; Shafer's majority 33.

County attorney—McNinch 120; Ferneau 102. McNinch's majority 18.

County commissioner—Barnes 130; Stevenson 93. Barnes' majority 37.

Assessor—Drain 128; Roberts 81. Drain's majority 47.

Justice of the peace to fill vacancy—Minick 131; Anderson 79. Minick's majority 52.

Con table to fill vacancy—Flack 125; scattering 4.

Road overseers—Dist. 32, Morrison 38; Stillwell 17. Morrison's majority 21. Dist. 33, Fuller 17; Jarvis 18. Jarvis' majority 1. Dist. 34, Russell 25; Gongwer 31. Gongwer's majority 6.

Rev C H Gilmore was the only man on the prohibition ticket to get a vote, and he got only 1. The "liberty" and "by petition" tickets did not get a vote.

We did not succeed in securing rooms for lo, Snel Cochran had been there before us and arranged for being received into the county habitation when his better half became unable or unwilling to support him longer, and while we were there County Commissioner McIninch drove up and made a little display of his authority by cautioning the managers against admitting one who might earn a living if so disposed. Every year as it rolls around finds Uncle John and his wife at the poor farm and still looking after the needy with almost parental regard, while every taxpayer in the county says it is well and that the faithful couple with a stock of human affection and true firmness to fit them for the place should be retained until such time as they shall hear the welcome applaudit, "Come ye blessed of my father," etc. Nemaha county has been very fortunate in that the poor have been cared for righteously while the drafts on our exchequer have not been great.—Granger.

Great Republican Gains.

Tuesday's Election in
Nemaha County.

REPUBLICANS Elect
BARTON, BERLET
and ARMSTRONG.

Burkett Carries the
County.

Fusion Majority of 368
on head of Ticket last
year almost gone.

The election in Nemaha county last Tuesday was an eye opener to the fusionists. Two years ago Holcomb carried the county by 544. Last year Sullivan, fusion candidate for supreme judge, got 308 majority. This year Poynter carries the county by only 11. Two years ago Broady, fusion candidate for congress, got 441 majority. This year Burkett, republican, carries the county by 8. Two years ago the fusionists elected the legislative ticket by majorities ranging from 255 to 407. This year the republicans elect three of the four. There has been a great change. Next year Nemaha county will be safely republican.

We enclose a supplement containing a complete abstract of the official canvass of the vote cast in this county.

Barton, candidate for float senator, received a majority of 392 in Johnson county, giving a majority of 320 in the district. Berlet, candidate for float representative, received a majority of 326 in Johnson county, giving him a majority in the two counties of 388.

Swan has only 1 majority over his associate, Jones, and the latter talks of contesting the election, as he claims a number of votes were counted for Swan in Auburn that should not have been so counted.
