TRADE REPORT.

Growing Strength in the Pig Iron Situation—Leading Breadstuffs Higher—Wool sales Good—Failures.

New York, Nov. 19.—Bradstreet's commercial report to-day says: Several substantial developments present themselves this week, notable among which are a number of advances in prices, exceptionally few declines thereof, growing strength in the pig iron situation, unprecedentedly large week in bank clearings, and remarkably good reports as to export trade, not only in the line of foreign products, but in enlarged trade in manufactured products.

First and foremost in the line of foreign trade extension are the returns recently made for October, pointing to exports for that month larger than in the corresponding month of any preceding year, second only to those of December last year, and chargeable not only so much as formerly to enlarged demand of farm products, but to heavily increased exports of finished products of American industry.

LEPERS AT LARGE.

Through the Neglect of Spanish Officials Nearly 200 of the Afflicted Wander at Will in Manila.

Vancouver, B. C., Nov. 19.—Advices by the steamship Empress of China state that there is a leper scare in Manila. Through the neglect of the Spanish officials nearly 200 lepers have escaped from confinement. For a time this was unknown to the American authorities and the outcasts were allowed to wander at large. Orders have been issued to the effect that all lepers will be arrested and sent to a small, uninhabited island on the southeast of Luzon. On this island the American government will establish a harborage for the lepers of the Philippines. They will be fed and cared for at the expense of the government. As far as can be ascertained about 60 lepers are still at large on the streets and in the suburbs of Manila.

DEMANDS STATE CURRENCY.

Legislature of Georgia Determines to Have the Federal Prohibition Tax Treated—Commission to Issue Money.

Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 19.—The house of representatives has passed a bill providing for a test of the constitutionality of the federal ten per cent. tax on state bank issues. The bill provides that a commission consisting of the treasurer, comptroller and governor of the state shall issue circulating currency notes to the extent of 75 per cent. of its capital stock to any bank applying for the same. These notes will then be used as ordinary legal tender and if the government prosecutes the banker or attempts to collect the ten per cent. tax the attorney general of the state is to appeal the case to the supreme court of the United States.

One Railway Wreck Caused Another.

Davenport, Ia., Nov. 19.—One railway wreck caused another to-day, resulting in the injury of a number of workmen. Two freight trains on the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific collided at Moscow, Ia. One man was killed and one injured. A wrecking train which was about to start to the scene from Wilton was run into by a fast mail train. The fireman of the mail train was badly hurt and 16 men on the work train were injured, some seriously.

No Trouble Anticipated in Porto Rico.

Washington, Nov. 19.—The war department does not anticipate any trouble in Porto Rico growing out of disorderly conduct of troops recently sent there. There was some trouble with soldiers of the Sixth Immunes and forty-seventh New York about the time of their arrival, but it was soon quieted. The lack of discipline in the volunteer organizations is believed to have been responsible for the disturbance, but the officers are getting better control of their men.

Lukewarm Toward Mission Work.

Detroit, Mich., Nov. 19.—Lack of genuine interest of church members in city evangelization was a complaint numerously heard to-day during the opening business session of the annual convention of the National City Evangelization union of the M. E. church. The faith and energy of workers in city fields outside of the churches, however, appeared undaunted and in some respects encouraging progress was shown.

Fierce Fight Over Right of Way.

South McAlester, I. T., Nov. 19.—The Choctaw, Oklahoma & Gulf and Missouri Pacific railway people are engaged in one of the fiercest legal battles ever fought in the United States, over the right of way between the Indian territory line and Little Rock, each line claiming that it has a prior right to the right of way, which if built on by both companies would give parallel lines.

Desperate Attempt to Escape.

Columbus, O., Nov. 19.—There was a desperate attempt made by two convicts to escape from the penitentiary about eight o'clock this morning, as a result of which Guard Charles D. Lauterbach, of Mount Vernon, was shot and killed, while Convicts O'Neill and Atkinson received injuries of a serious nature and both are now in the prison hospital.

HOUSEHOLD ITEMS.

Various Suggestions Which May Be of Service to the Busy Housewife.

Sausage and veal rolls are among the reasonable breakfast dishes or luncheon dishes that may be cooked in the chafing dish. Allow to one-half pound of sausage an equal quantity of veal chopped fine, and the same amount of stale bread crumbs. Mix well and season, with one level teaspoonful of celery salt, one of lemon juice, one of onion juice, two small red peppers seeded and shredded, and a quarter of a bunch of parsley cut fine. Make into rolls, dip in beaten egg, then in fine crumbs and cook in chafing dish, using enough butter to keep from sticking.

Baked quinces make a fine luncheon dish, and may be used like baked apples. Baked apples and quinces may also be used in combination; baking until very soft and stuffing cored apples with quinces. Pared and sliced they may be cooked thick and molded in fancy cups or dish if not too large.

The skirt of an old gingham gown makes one of the best kinds of kitchen aprons for service. It covers the dress skirt entirely, and is just the right length, an important desideratum where the one place that is sure to get spotted on a gown worn in the kitchen is on the lower edge.

Peaches should never be pared until about to serve, as they darken with but a few moments' standing. They should, however, be kept icy cold. A good way to chill them is to pack them in a pail or basket and set in one pan of cracked ice, placing another pan of ice on top of them.

With the annual transit of the stovepipe and consequent distribution of soot along its route, forwarned is forearmed. Have ready a goodly supply of salt or cornmeal, and as fast as the soot falls on the carpet cover quickly and then sweep up.

Before laying in the winter's supply of coal protect the sides of the house by pieces of carpet or burlaps tacked on, and close all the doors opening into the coal cellar. If registers are used, close and cover with paper.

If sal soda and water are poured down the kitchen sink at least once a week the plumber's visit may be indefinitely postponed.

In making plum or fruit cakes add a little chocolate, if the batter does not seem quite dark enough.

In ironing tablecloths the creases should be varied from time to time so as to avoid wear.

In making clam fritters omit salt if the clam liquor is used.—Washington Star.

Tailoring Under Difficulties.

Mr. Knight, the adventurous correspondent of the London Times, who got into Cuba after 24 hours' immersion in the water about three months ago, has just returned from Havana. Once in the city he was unable to get out. One of his most amusing adventures occurred when he was imprisoned in Fort Morro, before his identity was fully established. He landed on the coast in rags, and when he got to the prison asked that a tailor should be sent to him. The tailor came, but was not admitted to the cell in which Mr. Knight was confined. However, he measured the war correspondent through the bars of the window, and next day returned with the garments cut and pinned together for the trying on. This was accomplished with some difficulty, Mr. Knight standing up close to the bars while the tailor did the fitting. The suit proved to be a remarkably good fit, and Mr. Knight wears it with pride in London.—Boston Journal.
