Consul Turner writes from Cadiz to the
state department that farming in Spain is in
a primitive state. Grain is cut with a small
reaping hook and thrashed as in the time of
the Caesars, by tramping it out with asses
hitched to a stone boat. The plow is a
crooked stick pointed with iron. In the
towns are to be seen heavy wooden carts
drawn by oxen. Most of the carrying, trans-
ferring, etc., is done by donkeys. Sand,
brick, lumber—in fact, almost everything
that has to be moved—is carried on their
backs.

One of the strangest things in India is the
multitude of deserted capitals. There are
three old Delhis, three successive capitals of
the east, all close to each other, all south of
the present city. One of the three is Tug-
lucabad, a marvelous city on a hill, roofless
and absolutely deserted, but solid and gigan-
tic. The second is Ferozabad, with a hand-
ful of inhabitants. The third is the old Delhi
of Kutub, who was born a Turkish slave and
died emperor of India. His name still sur-
vives in the finest tower in the world and in
the oldest mosque in India.

Millais' Portrait of Gladstone.

Sir John Millais' portrait of Mr. Gladstone,
which was subscribed for by the women of
England and which has been in the hands of
the engraver, has, says the London corre-
spondent of The Northern Echo, only just
reached Hawarden. In acknowledging it
Mr. Gladstone writes: "Now that the picture
has arrived, it calls for fresh and new words
of gratitude. We cannot express all our
feelings, but the kind donors, those who have
joined in this beautiful gift, will care to know
that it has brought joy and deepest grati-
tude. Will you make known to them that
their gift has brought joy and gladness into
our dear old home! We shall never look at it,
blending as it does the present and future,
without thankfulness." Lady Aberdeen,
who was the honorary treasurer of the fund,
is now making up her accounts. She finds
that some 3,000 ladies contributed a sum of
about \$1,000. A thousand pounds was Sir
John Millais' fee, while the estimate for en-
graving the picture comes to \$200. There is,
therefore, an additional \$200 required, which
Lady Aberdeen hopes to receive before
March, when the engraving will be complete.

The Committees in Congress.

To the member of congress a committee
place means almost everything. Upon the
assignment to committees depend in large
measure his usefulness, his prominence in the
affairs of the body of which he is a member,
his success as a statesman. If he wants op-
portunity to make speeches, he will do well
to get on one or other of the committees in
control of important legislation. If he wants
influence in the department, let him be care-
ful of his committee assignments. A curious
illustration of the power of committees in the
executive departments is found in the fact
that Mr. Randall, as Democratic chairman
of the committee on appropriations, was able
to secure many appointments of friends to
office under Republican administrations, while
Mr. Cannon, a prominent Republican mem-
ber of the same committee, was able to find
places for several of his followers under a
Democratic regime.—Washington Letter.

A Royal Duke's Stamps.

The duke of Edinburgh is an ardent stamp
collector. When in Lisbon, during the obs-
equies of the late king of Portugal, he visited
a shop in the Praça de Luiz de Camoes, and
made a considerable purchase of rare speci-
mens which he had not hitherto been able to
obtain. He has now one of the finest collec-
tions extant.—Pall Mall Gazette.
