BIG MAJORITY.

Republicans Sure of at Least 230 Members in the Next House.

A SCORE MORE PROBABLE.

Populists Likely to Hold the Balance of Power in the Senate.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—Chairman Babcock of the Republican congressional committee says that the reports received during the day give the Republicans 230 out of the 356 members of the house beyond peradventure, while there is a possibility of securing 27 additional members.

Mr. Babcock also stated that his information leads him to believe that there is a possibility of securing three more members from Alabama, two from Illinois, one each from Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky and Nebraska; two from Ohio, two from Pennsylvania, two from Missouri, one from Arkansas, three from Louisiana, three from Texas and one from South Carolina. If these claims are realized it will give the Republicans 257 members, or a majority of 99 members.

According to the claims of the Republicans they will be able to secure the votes of at least 30 of the 44 states, in case the next presidential election is thrown into the house, as they will have either the solid delegations or a majority in each of the delegations from that number of states.

MORE IN DETAIL.

Table Showing the Composition of Congress by States.

CHICAGO, Nov. 8.—The following table shows the standing of the next congress, as nearly as can be computed from returns received up to a late hour. A number of districts in different states are still in doubt.

Texas is not included in totals as results in seven districts are doubtful. Alabama and Colorado also report one each as doubtful. Nevada elected a silver congressman.

THE NEXT SENATE.

It Will Consist of 40 Democrats, 41 Republicans and 6 Populists.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—Reports received indicate that the next senate will have 40 Democrats, 41 Republicans and 6 Populists, while the attitude of the successor to Senator Harris of Tennessee is still in doubt. In this classification, Senators Stewart and Jones of Nevada, who were elected by the Republicans but have announced their separation from that party, and Governor Tillman, who will doubtless be elected by the so-called Independent Democrats of the South Carolina legislature, are placed in the Populist column. Tillman will probably vote with the Democrats on organization and Stewart and Jones of Nevada and Peffer with the Republicans. This would throw the balance of power into the hands of the Populists.

Mormons Voted Republican.

BOISE, Ida., Nov. 8.—The entire Republican ticket is elected by 2,000 plurality or more. Legislature returns indicate the legislature will be Republican. The Mormon vote seems to have gone strongly Republican.

Carried Every District.

JACKSON, Miss., Nov. 9.—The Democrats have carried every district in the state. The Populists polled a surprisingly large vote in the Sixth district and Denny pulled through by the skin of his teeth.

Six Democratic Congressmen.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Nov. 9.—The Democrats have elected their six congressmen from this state by majorities ranging from 1,000 to 6,000.

Owens Is Elected.

LXINGTON, Ky., Nov. 8.—The latest returns in the Ashland district give Owens 118 majority.
