A Head End Collision.

His wounds were promptly dressed by the resident physician, Dr. Buchanan. No one on the freight train was hurt as the crew all left the train as soon as they saw the coming train. The passengers while considerably shaken up sustained no injuries. Both engines were badly damaged and two freight boxes derailed. A wrecking crew was soon on hand and in about six hours the track was cleared so that all trains were running as usual.

The accident was due to the fact that the conductor of the freight train in reading the orders that the second section of number 30 would be an hour and a half late overlooked the fact that the first section would be on time.
