AN ORDINANCE

To raise supplies for the fiscal year commencing January 1st, 1921, and ending December 31st, 1921, and to provide for Electric Lights, Water and Sewerage Bonds.

State of South Carolina,
Town of Winnsboro.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Winnsboro in council met, and by authority of the same.

Section 1. That for the purpose of raising supplies for the year commencing January 1st, 1921, and ending December 31st, 1921, and to pay interest on \$10,000.00 Electric Bonds, \$50,000.00 Water Works bonds, \$20,000.00 Sewerage bonds and \$10,000.00 additional Electric Light bonds of the Town of Winnsboro, and to create a sinking fund to pay the one-fortieth part of the principal of said bonds, a tax for the same and in the manner hereinafter mentioned is hereby levied and shall be raised and paid into the treasury of the Town for the use and service thereof, that is to say: Seventeen (17) mills ad valorem on every dollar of the value of all property, real and personal, within the corporate limits of the Town of Winnsboro, to be distributed as follows, to wit:

Three dollars to be paid by every male inhabitant of the Town of Winnsboro between the ages of sixteen and fifty years in lieu of working the streets of the said town of Winnsboro, except college students and other exceptions as provided for by State law.

Section 2. All taxes assessed and payable under this ordinance shall be payable between the 1st day of November, 1921, and the 1st day of January, 1922, and all taxes and penalties remaining on the 1st day of January, 1922 shall be collected by distress or otherwise, as now provided by law, together with all legal costs.

Section 3. When taxes assessed and charged against any property shall not be paid on or before the 1st day of January, 1922, a penalty of 15 per cent thereon shall be added to the amount so assessed and charged on taxes by the Town Treasurer, and if the said taxes and penalties shall not be paid at once, the same shall be treated as delinquent taxes of and upon the property of

the person owning the said property to be collected by distress, or by levy upon and sale of such property, or otherwise, as provided by law.

Done in Council this 4th day of October, A. D. 1921, and with the corporate seal of the said town affixed.

JIM GOLEY FOUND DEAD.

J. H. Gibson, coroner of Fairfield county, was summoned on Sunday by H. P. Robertson to go to Rion to hold an inquest over the body of Jim Goley, who was dead in his home. Goley lived alone and was last seen about 11 days ago. He was found dead in his bed room, lying on his side with the left side of his head blown off. A plow line was tied to his left hand and also tied to the trigger guard and the rear trigger of a double barreled muzzle loading shotgun. He had on all his clothes with the exception of his shoes which were by the bed, and his overcoat. The most peculiar fact in the case was that the gun was in an upright position leaning against the bureau. Dr. J. E. Douglass, Jr., who examined the dead man, said that he had been dead at least 11 days. The coroner's jury brought in a verdict that Jim Goley had come to his death by gunshot wounds at his own hands.

Goley was 57 years old and unmarried. He is survived by one brother, Ed Goley, of Columbia.
