MRS. NANCY S. RAGSDALE

The entire community was grieved to learn of the death of Mrs. Nancy Stanton Ragsdale, which occurred at the home of her son, Senator Glenn W. Ragsdale, at 8 o'clock Saturday morning. Her death was not unexpected as she had been in failing health for some time past.

She was the oldest resident of Winnsboro, being in her 89th year. She was born in Fairfield county near Jenkinsville, where she spent the early part of her life. She was married in 1853 to Elisha R. Ragsdale and she has been a widow since the Confederate war, her husband having died in a Confederate hospital in Richmond, Va., in 1862. Mrs. Ragsdale was a woman of lovely Christian character and was a lifelong member of the Baptist church. She is survived by only one child, Senator G. W. Ragsdale with whom she made her home.

The funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at the First Baptist church, Winnsboro, at 3 o'clock, the interment taking place in the Episcopal cemetery.

AN ORDINANCE

Providing that all Property Holders owning property abutting on Congress and Evans Streets, make Water and Sewerage Connections.

Whereas the Town of Winnsboro having resolved to pave Congress and Evans Streets of said Town, and whereas, it will be greatly inconvenient and expensive to tear up and remove said pavement for the purpose of making water and sewerage connections:

Now, Therefore be it enacted and ordained by the Town Council of the Town of Winnsboro:

Section 1. That all property holders owning property abutting on Congress Street and Evans Street of the Town of Winnsboro, (whether the said property be occupied or vacant) are hereby required to make water and sewerage connections with the water and Sewer mains on said Congress and Evans Streets, within the period of thirty days from the publication of this ordinance.

Section 2. That after the lapse of thirty days from the passage of this ordinance, no removal of street pavement shall be permitted for the purpose of making water and sewerage connections within the period of ten years.

Done in Council this 8th, day of November, A. D. 1922, and with the Corporate seal of the said Town affixed.
