THE LEADING JOURNALS ON THE NOMINATION OF BLAINE.

A Certain Grim Sense of Satisfaction at the Overwhelming Defeat in Store for the Republican Party and its Man.

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THE GROWING CROPS.

Their Condition as Shown by Reports Received by the State Department of Agriculture.

COLUMBIA, S. C., June 12.—The Department of Agriculture has received 310 reports from township correspondents showing the condition of the crops June 11.

WHEAT.—The reports on the condition of wheat are very favorable, especially in the largest wheat producing counties—the northern section of the State.

THE OATS.—The oat crop was subjected to many unfavorable conditions, and only that portion sown early is reported up to an average.

CORN.—With the exception of the latter part of May, the month was very favorable for corn. The rains were not sufficient to interfere with the working of the crop.

THE POTATOES.—The reports on the condition of corn vary in the different sections of the State. In some localities it is said to be in a remarkably good condition.

THE SUGAR BEET.—The condition of the sugar beet crop is reported as being in a remarkably good condition in many sections.

THE CUCUMBERS.—The reports on the condition of cucumbers are generally favorable, especially in the northern section of the State.

THE PEAS.—The reports on the condition of peas are generally favorable, especially in the northern section of the State.

THE PUMPKINS.—The reports on the condition of pumpkins are generally favorable, especially in the northern section of the State.
