Six men took a unique examination recently at the Navy Department. They were competing for appointments as finger experts of the U. S. Navy. The successful candidates will aid in installing the pudd'n Head Wilson system of identification in the Navy. The salary of a finger expert is \$1,800 per year.

A glance at the figures in the election last fall for mayor of New York City shows that Hearst's chances of being elected governor on the fusion ticket are very bright. Tammany's votes will this year be cast for the young editor, while last year it went largely to McClellan. Moreover, Hearst has a host of followers all over the state.

The U. S. Supreme Court will take up a number of cases of national interest in the coming term. Among others are that of the miners who are charged with the assassination of Governor Steunenberg of Idaho; of Albert Patrick of New York, who is attempting to escape the death penalty; and the famous Isle of Pines case, which is to decide whether this island is foreign territory or not.
