### News Notes.

Frank H. Jones, assistant cashier of the Charlotte National Bank, has gone, and with him \$68,000 of the bank's money. Jones was a member of the Presbyterian church and very active in church affairs. Another case of a good man on the wrong side of the stock market.

One of Uncle Sam's mail bags containing valuables to the amount of \$400,000 was stolen while en route between New York and Havre or between Havre and Paris. The surprising thing is that the thieves did not steal the steamship.

One thousand pounds of dynamite exploded in the powder mills at Emporium, Pa., and six men lost their lives. The jar was felt in towns 20 miles distant. Not a vestige of the six men of the mill or tools were found—only a hole in the ground.

Burglars entered the depot and postoffice at Honca Path, Wednesday night. Eight dollars in money and a valise were taken.

Rev. Henry Whitney Cleveland, aged 71, died in Louisville, Ky., on the 20th inst. He was a native of Georgia and private secretary to Alexander H. Stevens, and in President Davis' secret service. He was related to ex-President Cleveland.

Edward Howell, a banker and one of the most influential negroes in southern Mississippi, was shot in the back and killed while on his way home.

By the sinking of the German steamer "Horn" in the North Sea, 210 persons lost their lives.

Divorces in high life come high. Miss Anna Gould's lawyers have presented her a bill for \$175,000 for securing a divorce for her from her French count. Bro. George, who has charge of the countess' interests, refuses to settle.

Mrs. A. L. Adams, of Greer, has entered suit against the Southern railroad for \$10,000 damages. She was a passenger on train 11 that ran into an empty coal car left standing on the main line and was wrecked. Mrs. Adams received injuries for which she asks the above sum.
