GREETING.

EVER since the introduction of the newspaper system as a means of disseminating news and knowledge, those who have taken the editorship of any journal have usually outlined, in the first issue, the principles they expect to advocate and the policy they intend to pursue.

Politically speaking, we shall advocate the principles of the Peoples' Party as promulgated at Omaha, Neb., July 4th, 1892; and shall champion the cause of Reform in general. We believe that only the Government should be allowed to issue money; that the Government should loan money direct to the people at a rate of interest not to exceed 3 per cent.; that all money put in circulation should be absolute irredeemable money, and a full legal tender for all debts and dues to and from the Government, and between man and man; that the volume of money should be increased to at least \$60. per capita, and that said volume of money should not be diminished nor increased except in a fixed ratio to the population of the country; that

the rules governing the loaning of said money by the Government should be such as to prevent any wealthy corporation from taking it in large quantities for the purpose of absorbing and controlling it.

We believe that all officers from Postmaster to President should be elected by a direct vote of the people, and that we should have the Initiative and Referendum enacted into national law, as a means of protecting and preserving of liberties; that the Government should own and operate the railroads and coal mines of the United States.

For fifteen years past we have stood up, shoulder to shoulder, and fought for principle. Have at all times and on all occasions dared to proclaim that which we believed to be right regardless of the consequence.
