Thursday morning about four o'clock, J. C. Goodwin's creamery in West Kittitas was burned. Loss about \$3,000, insured for \$1,500.

Everything pointed to the work of an incendiary and steps were immediately taken to run down the criminal. Yesterday, Joe Burns, of this city, was arrested, charged with the crime. The examination was had before Justice Stewart last evening and the defendant bound over in the sum of \$2,000 for his appearance in the Superior Court. The evidence is all circumstantial. If the defendant is innocent, we hope he will be able to prove his innocence and secure an acquittal, but if he is guilty, we hope he will be convicted and get the full limit of the law. Any man who will commit arson, and especially, one who can be hired to do so, is a very dangerous man to run at large. While such a man as that is at large, nobody is safe. We hope justice will be meted out in this case. The loss by the burning of the creamery will be keenly felt by the citizens of the West side as well as by the owner.

We presume Mr. Goodwin will rebuild, although we have not heard him say.
