THE Government has determined
to issue fifty million dollars of gold
interest bearing bonds. The issue
is to be made in a few days.

Many people, who one year ago,
supposed themselves far removed
from the possibility of want, are
now wondering how long it will
take to reach the end of their string.

THIS country is suffering from an
underproduction of something to
to buy wheat with, and an overpro-
duction of mortgages, bonds, bad
weather and law suits, a combina-
tion hard to beat.

It is amusing to witness the
frantic efforts of the editor of the
Capital to make it appear that his
paper wielded a little bit of influ-
ence during the last campaign, es-
pecially, when he says it was his
exposure of the fusion scheme that
defeated the Populists. Such is not

the fact. The Populist ticket was
defeated in convention when the
wishes of the people had to give way
for a few "place-hunters." The
wonder is, with the load they had
to carry, that any of the ticket was
elected. No, Mr. Editor, the men
who ran the Populist convention
are the ones who defeated the tick-
et, and not you.

CLEVELAND is selling \$50,000,000
more of gold interest bearing bonds
under the plea that it is necessary
to do so in order to maintain the
gold reserve in the treasury. He
presumes a great deal on the gulla-
bility of the American people if he
thinks he can work any such a
racket. The American people un-
derstand that these sales of bonds
do not add one dollar more to the
surplus in the Treasury. That the
gold paid for these bonds is gold
that has been drawn out of the
Treasury for paper money present-
ed for that purpose. Why don't
they pay out the silver in exchange
for paper as the law permits?

That would be contrary to the
policy of both the democratic and
republican parties, as dictated by
Wall street. The only sensible way
out of this affair is to lay aside your
prejudices and come into the ranks
of the Populist party.

the rooster at the head of the demo-
cratic columns since the last elec-
tion.

How we ought to love the g. o. p.
Under its rule only \$20,000,000,000

Such facts as the following can-
not be too frequently or too forcibly
impressed upon the minds of the
people:

Between 1862 and 1868 the gov-
ernment sold bonds to the amount
of \$2,049,985,790.

The amount of money received
for these bonds by the government
was \$2,377,424,238.

On these bonds the government
has paid in principal \$1,756,000,000.

On these same bonds the govern-
ment has paid in interest \$2,538,
000,000.

By a summing up of the results
of this bond transaction the follow-
ing facts are shown:

Received by the government \$1,
371,424,238.

Paid out by the government \$4,
350,000,000.

Net profit to bondholders \$2,980,
575,762.

If this amount had been paid in
wheat the bondholders would have
received as a present, 3,022,000,000
bushels.

As the government is the agent
of the people to conduct their busi-
ness, this little bond transaction is
a robbery of the masses direct, of
nearly \$3,000,000,000, or over two
billion more than there is in circula-
tion of all kinds of money at the
present time.
