## About Your Taxes.

Many inquiries have been made  
as to when taxes become due under  
the new law. The treasurer is re-  
quired to begin the collection of the  
1894 taxes the second Monday in  
January, or Jan. 8th, 1895. To  
all parties paying their taxes on or  
before Feb. 15th, a 2 per cent re-  
bate is allowed. All taxes become  
delinquent April 1, 1895, and after  
that date must be paid with a pen-  
alty of 5 per cent. added and inter-  
est at the rate of 20 per cent per  
annum. This rate of interest will  
be charged on all delinquent taxes  
except for 1890 and previous years,  
which is 10 per cent per annum.

The new tax law also provides  
that property must not be sold for

taxes until two years after it be-  
comes delinquent, and if the prop-  
erty is not redeemed within 2 years  
from date of sale it becomes the ab-  
solute property of the purchaser.

This year, and hereafter, accord-  
ing to the new law, both city and  
county taxes must be paid at the  
office of the county treasurer. The  
county treasurer turns monthly to  
the city treasurer all moneys col-  
lected on account of the city.
