The Senator will find he cannot choke off investigation in that manner nor save his dear friends on the Board.

The people are becoming tired of such rottenness and are demanding that the investigation be thorough and complete—that it go to the bottom—that no man be spared because he occupies a prominent place in society or has a few dollars to use in covering up crookedness.

That there has not only been mismanagement in connection with the construction of the Normal building at this place, but that there has been notorious crookedness, no one outside the board and their friends will deny.
