NEXT TO OFFICIAL.

The following statement is from a letter just received by us from Washington, D. C. If such statement has been made by a member of the cabinet, it is the most important one yet published. Events seem to corroborate it, for politics is certainly shaping itself that way:

Political sensations are not everyday occurrences in Washington at this season of the year, but one, of the first magnitude, has followed the statement of a member of the cabinet, that President Cleveland regarded it as certain that the republican and democratic parties would both split on the silver question and that the next campaign would be fought solely on that issue, and that all past differences would be forgotten and the members of all parties would line up as silver or gold men and not as republicans, democrats and Populists. He further stated that Mr. Cleveland considered himself the logical candidate of the gold party, and believed that he would be elected. This view of the situation has been taken by others, but this is the first time that it has been authoritatively stated as President Cleveland's view of it.
