After all this whoopedoodle over Kenlucky, what does the result amount to when it is analyzed? Though Bradley is elected, he received just the same vote as the republican candidate got in 1891, when he was defeated by 30,000. Bradley, though elected, got 20,000 fewer votes than Harrison received in 1888, yet the latter was badly defeated in the state. What is the significance of it all? Simply that about sixty odd thousand democratic votes are not accounted for. What became of them? Most of them stayed away from the polls in disgust, some (goldbug) voted the republican ticket and a few went over to the Populist. Those who did not vote are already half Populist and the other half will be ripe in time. All roads from democracy and republicanism leads to Populism.

CARTER'S VIEW.

"During a discussion of party measures, Chairman Carter took occasion to say that he did not think it wise for the republicans to be too confident. Although it was apparent that victory was in the air, he said that there were reasons why it was not well to be optimistic to a degree of carelessness. He thought the grave question before the country might well cause the republicans to pause and reflect.

The president had placed himself squarely in favor of retiring the credit money of the country. It was possible that the financial centers of the country agreed with him. There was no doubt that a course of that kind, if pursued, would make Populistic votes. Mr. Carter called attention to what he styled the remarkable growth of the Populistic vote. He said that it had increased 240 per cent during the past three years. This great growth had not been developed in the national legislature, as there were less Populists in the house now than in the Fifty-second Congress, but the vote in the different elections showed a Populistic increase, which it was well for the republicans to take into consideration."

RETURNING PROSPERITY.

Worse and worse! According to Bradstreet's review of trade for last week the total number of business failures throught the United States for the week aggregates 377 as compared with 353 the previous week, 308 in the like week one year ago, and 353 two years ago. You see how times pick up on a gold basis, and the republicans in control of Congress, too. How do you like "the change?"—Vancouver Register.

ALLEN'S RESOLUTOIN.

Detailed Vote of Its Passage By The Senate. The Vote Stood 36 to 24.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 31.—The adoption of Senator Allen's motion for the free coinage of silver at 16 to 1 in view of the expected war over Venezuela passed by a vote of 36 to 24. The following is the vote:

The county assessor has certified the roll of 1896 to the auditor in which is made the following showing for the principal towns in the county:

Roslyn—Valuation \$203,582; county and state levy, 19.3 mills; municipal, 10 mills; special school, 5 mills; total, 34.3 mills.
