PITCHFORK-REVOLVER

Figured in an Early Morning Affray.

M. E. Grubbs, who was formerly in the livery business in this city, was quite seriously injured in a fight this morning at W. A. Langham's livery stable, in which Grubbs, Geo. Adams and J. T. Jetts were the principals. Grubbs was very drunk and so badly frightened that he thought he would surely die. A reporter for the DAILY ENTERPRISE found him in a room in the rear of Dunlap's drug store and asked him to state his side of the story, and his answer was, "My precious man, I can't tell you anything; I can't breathe in my left side, and can't talk."

A physician was called and examined the wound made by the pitchfork, and said that it was not dangerous. After applying some relief Grubbs was put on the train and sent to his home at Orange.

A reporter went to Langham's stable, where the trouble occurred, and found the proprietor, W. A. Langham, and learned that Grubbs came over from Orange last night and was in a drunken condition when he arrived here. He went to Langham's stable and was going to take away a saddle which he claimed. Mr. Langham took the saddle away from him when Grubbs pulled a gun, which Langham also took away from him. He continued his drinking, and this morning while at the stable met George Adams and J. T. Jetts, Adams' stepfather. Grubbs attacked Adams with a heavy wrench and Adams drew a revolver and pounded Grubbs over the head, while it is said that Jetts struck Grubbs with a pitchfork and then stabbed him with it, one time entering the center of the back just below the shoulder blade. The injuries from the revolver were on the left side and back of the head.

An inquiry into the cause of the trouble between Grubbs and Adams reveals the fact that there is a woman in the case. It seems that when Grubbs bought the livery stable Adams worked for him and boarded with him. As a result it is said that there was an intimacy between Mrs. Grubbs and Adams which has ruined their home, and that Grubbs had sworn to kill Adams, and came to Beaumont for that purpose and got drunk in order to nerve himself to do so. Adams heard last night that Grubbs was here for the purpose of killing him and prepared himself.

Officers Leonard and Rackley took Adams and Jetts in charge and turned them over to Deputy Sheriff Broussard, who locked them up.
