

Washington, Oct. 13.—Ex-Governor Foraker, of Ohio, has again stated that under the resolution passed by congress the United States has no right to place an army in Cuba.

Texas Quarantines.

Austin, Oct. 12.—The following proclamation was issued by the governor today:

Whereas, Yellow fever of a malignant and fatal type prevails in the States of Louisiana and Mississippi, and

Whereas, Said disease has spread so generally through said States and the foci thereof are so numerous as to render quarantine against particular points ineffectual;

Now, therefore, I, Charles A. Culberson, governor of Texas, by virtue of the authority vested in me by law, do hereby declare quarantine against the States of Louisiana and Mississippi, and all quarantine officials of this State and others charged with duties in connection therewith are hereby directed to enforce the same impartially and rigidly.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of State to be affixed at the city of Austin, this the 12th day of October, A. D. 1898.

Raised a Row.

Orange raised a row because a grading outfit was allowed to come to Beaumont.

The only parties that came in on the train from Louisiana did so by Dr. Blunt's special permission and were admitted on the request of the city health officer of Beaumont. They consisted of R. L. Andrews and his grading outfit, five men and two colored female cooks. They came from near Crowley, La., which was not infected, and the train which conveyed them did not stop at Lake Charles or any other point that was even suspected of infection.

Dr. Blunt then handed the following letter to the reporter:

Beaumont, Texas, Oct. 12.—Dear Sir: Some question having been raised as to the party brought here with my grading outfit from Crowley yesterday, I beg to state that, in addition to myself, I had five men and two colored women, the women being employed as cooks in my camp; and I am in a position to make affidavit that none of these parties have been in any infected district for the past four months. In fact, they have been in camp about seven miles from Crowley and out in the country. Very respectfully,

The supposition that these parties had come from an infected locality stirred up the spirit which caused Orange to cut off the trains, but it is hoped the action will be reconsidered and that the needless embargo will be speedily removed.
