FORT CLARK LETTER.

No More Discharges For the Third.

Fort Clark, Texas, Nov. 10.—The daily papers which have drifted into the post for the past few days have contained statements to the effect that no more discharges would be granted to members of the Third Texas, as the regiment had been reduced as much as was consistent with the established standard of a fighting footing.

Private Jack Woods of company D contemplates sending the following rather musical application to the secretary of war, hoping that his heart will be sufficiently softened by it that he will not only grant him an honorable discharge but send along a letter for the use of the few members of D company still left in the service:

Way down on Key West Island, An old, established post, Some sixty miles from Cuba, Just off the Florida coast, Where Companies M and D were sent—

Wants Grace Arrested.

A recent Boston special says: "Postoffice Inspector Saw today announced that Grace Barron, a young woman of North Adams, who was in flight several months ago upon the charge of using the mail to defraud, had been married at Beaumont, Texas, to W. A. Vest, the complainant in the case.

It was charged that Miss Barron frequently advertised for a husband and that many men, after agreeing to a marriage, sent her money to enable her to meet them. They did not hear from her again after sending the money.

One of the alleged victims was W. A. Vest of Beaumont, Texas, and he had her arrested early in the summer. Mr. Vest has notified Postoffice Inspector Saw that Miss Barron had been married and that they had been married. He enclosed a letter addressed to him from Mrs. Vest, in which she told her husband that she had married him to clear herself of the charges in the indictment, and was going to leave him and return to Massachusetts. Mr. Vest desires that she be arrested and sent back to him if possible.

Babcock Still Claims 13. Washington, D. C., Nov. 11.—At a late hour to night Chairman Babcock of the republican congressional committee said that the latest advice received by the committee make no change in the political complexion of the next house of representatives. The republicans, he said, would have 185 members, certainly, giving them a clear majority of 13. These figures were the same as those he gave to the Associated Press early in the day.
